

The aquaculture industry in Macquarie Harbour is stepping up its environmental efforts, with a renewed focus on reducing marine debris and enhancing sustainability.

All three companies operating in the region have combined forces, aiming to strengthen the impact of clean-up programs while engaging more effectively with the local community.





Crowd numbers were up on last year and a fantastic day of racing was complemented by the car show with 14 entries and kids activities supplied by the Rosebery Men's Shed.













Raiseboring projects takes off

A raiseboring machine is being used to drill the first of many ventilation rises, which will be 4.5 metres in diametre, 200 metres high and situated 1.4 kilometres below surface.

This is the most northern raiseboring exercise ever undertaken at Rosebery and opens up future mining opportunities



Works on expansion to Bobadil TSF to begin this year

MMG Rosebery has received final approval from West Coast Council to progress with an expansion of an existing tailings storage facility (TSF).

Works will begin this year on the Stage 11 and 12 embankment raises at the Bobadil TSF, providing around 3 years of additional tailings storage capacity.

Rosebery Mine General Manager Steve Scott said continued works at Bobadil and a capacity increase at 2/5 Dam has the potential to extend the life of our existing tailings facilities through to 2030, subject to permitting approvals.

"This is great news for our 600 strong workforce, our local communities and local supply chain that benefits from the ongoing operation and success of Rosebery Mine."

Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

FLORENCE MINE ACCIDENT, MAN DROWNS WHILE CLIMBING LADDER TO SAFETY

the closest headstone is that of Thomas Kestles, aged 47, who drowned in the Florence Mine just before midday on June 23, 1903. His body was recovered two days later, and he was buried in that grave on the following Sunday

A Coronial Enquiry commenced on Friday 26 June where evidence regarding identification and cause of death was heard, Dr. Butler stating that the mouth, nose, windpipe, lungs and stomach were all filled with a slate-coloured mud, causing suffocation.

Following months of delay owing to the incident site being flooded, the Coronial Enquiry reconvened on 12 November 1903. The previous day the coronial jury had inspected the site which was finally free from water, under the guidance of the Inspector of Mines, James Harrison.

The Enquiry heard that the shaft at the Florence mine was 200 feet deep, and five men were working at various distances extending out about 240 feet along a tunnel (number 2 level) driven from the bottom of the shaft towards Curries' Shaft, a mine which had not been in use for some three years and was known to have consequently filled with water. The far end of the level was about 70 feet away from Curries'.

William Craig and Alfred Burt had laid three explosive charges in the face of the tunnel and then gone to the surface with all the other men except Kestles and J.W. Farnell. Shortly after the charges went off there was a sudden inrush of muddy water which quickly filled the level and then continued up the shaft where the two careful examination of the working face at 11 men were desperately trying to climb up the o'clock that morning, as he had done on every ladderway to safety. Farnell was just ahead of shift, and found nothing to be concerned about.

Walking from the cemetery carpark today Kestles at number 1 level, about 100 feet from the surface when he heard Kestles say the water was getting close to him. After that he didn't see or hear him again. Farnell was only just able to get clear of the swirling water himself.



In addition to hearing evidence from eight ick H. Astle men about mining in the Florence and Curwas certain ries' Shaft, the enquiry also heard from James he had told Harrison and Assistant Government Geologist Kestles to use George Waller. Initially it was thought that the boreholes, inrush of water had come from Curries' Shaft, but after hearing the evidence it was found to be from an underground hole full of water (a vugh) which the explosion had disturbed.

The jury returned a verdict declaring Kestles' death was an accident, but added a rider stating that both James Harrison and the Frederick Astle were guilty of great neglect in not having taking more precautions when it was known that there was underground water in the area, boreholes. and for not having larger man holes in the ladderway to make escape easier.

This raised the ire of "The Zeehan and Dundas Herald" editor, who wrote that while the verdict declared the death was accidental, the rider asserted that negligence was displayed. Had the rider been incorporated in the finding then it would have amounted to an allegation of manslaughter against Harrison and Astle.

The township of Renison Bell

Tasmania is one of the most mineral-rich places on the planet, Bluestone's Renison Bell mine is home to more than 80 per cent of Australia's identified tin resource.

Why the name Renison Bell?

The site was first discovered in 1890 by a prospector on a six-month lone exploration in western Tasmania, George Renison Bell. Bell found and pegged a 1.3 square kilometre mineralised zone north of Zeehan.

In the years following his discovery, a number of companies worked the tinfield. The township of Renison Bell was established in 1909 to support a flurry of activity. However, the metallurgical technology at the time didn't allow for profitable recovery of tin from the complex low-grade ores.


As activities slowed, so did life in the township. By 1940's the town had dramatically reduced in size.

It wasn't until 1965 that deep drilling proved that Bell had in fact discovered an immense ore reserve. Sadly, Bell passed in 1915, without knowing he had discovered one of the world's largest known primary tin deposits.




