Dear Editor

To be honest, I'm pretty angry and sick of having to run the gauntlet of aggressive, stray dogs that wander our streets in Strahan and attack innocent little dogs; even dragging them out of their own yards and mauling them. The number of times owners are rushing their pets to vets and in some cases rushing their kids to medical treatment because of dog attack seems to be on the rise on the West Coast.

One only has to talk to neighbours or read our social media pages to know that some of dog owner community don't have control of their dogs and ducks, chickens, cats and smaller dogs as well and people are being attacked.

Most West Coasters don't feel comfortable to 'dob in their neighbour' but neighbours acting badly need to take responsibility and act like neighbours to safeguard others. Pet owners have the right to walk their loved family pet. They have the right to let their dog run around in their own back yard without worrying about dangerous uncontrolled dogs invading their yards and dragging their dogs and mauling them.

I personally don't have an issue over the choice of dog that an owner may want to have in their home; though I must admit I am not very comfortable with hunting dogs or large pit bull type breeds. For me, provided that owners are responsible and manage and contain their dogs in their own yards, I am pretty supportive of them owning their dogs and doing what they want with them. However, owners who have dangerous dogs or dogs with a history of attacking other people's pets or people need to contain their dogs or take serious steps to stop their behaviour.

Apart from the stress and distress of seeing your pet being mauled by these aggressive dogs, the stress and upset of having to travel 2 to 3 hours for veterinary support while your little dog is in pain and bleeding is a pretty awful experience. Then there is the expense of trying to treat your loved one and hoping like hell that the antibiotics, pain relief and treatments including surgeries will be enough to heal the dog that is part of your family.

These dangerous dogs are a real worry in our community. We have had visitors to Strahan upset and afraid of these dogs. Some neighbours are having to keep their children inside or closely supervised in their own back yards with fear that their neighbours' dogs are going to attack again. It's not good enough. At the moment it's been little pets being mauled, the fear is that the next attack could very well be a child and the consequences dire.

So to all the pet owns of the West Coast please think about your pet. If your dog has been known to hurt other animals, please take responsibility. Secure them in your own yard, muzzle them if they are out.

The message is simple- take bl@@ dy responsibility of your dogs. - Stop allowing them to wander unleashed and unmuzzled in our streets. Think about the rights of others- stop your dangerous dogs from wandering into other people's yards. Democracy under threat? Dear Editor

In recent years Council meetings have become for some residents an area of deep concern regarding good governance and transparency. With what appears to be an increase in the practices of limiting public participation, the ability to raise questions and for true debate to thrive publicly; significantly contributes to community members feeling anxious about the conduct and ways in which decisions are being made in local government. The example of the recent Council meeting which appears to show that a motion was moved by councillors to close off a number of agenda items does little to increase public confidence in decisions. Our Local government plays a critical role in Tasmania.: Council's help to build resilient communities, they contribute to the development of a healthy environment, and promote local economies. Good governance is critical to local government's success in carrying out these roles.

Good governance is important for several reasons. It not only gives the local community confidence in its council but improves the faith that elected members have in their own council and its decision-making processes. Good governance also leads to better and more efficient decisions, helps local government meet its legislative responsibilities, and provides an ethical basis for decision-making.

There have been several comments made in social media where community members have expressed fears that Council and Councillors appear to have failed to engage the community in a meaningful way over its decisions regarding social housing, workplace safety and the sale of community owned assets such as the USCCO building in Strahan. Like so many making comments on social media, what I don't understand is how closing meetings in the absence of legitimate safety concerns is acceptable and in keeping with our democratic rights of transparency and rate payer rights. There are real risks that the decision by councillors to close extensive agenda items alienates the people of the community from participating in the democratic process. Councillors already have their 'workshop meetings' which already raise anxiety of unacceptable democratic practices which while these workshops may be legal appear for many to be questionable ethically and raise questions about whether these 'workshops' are in keeping with the initial intent of council and council meetings for the purposes of robust debate and transparent decision making and good governance.



The LME nickel price is currently about \$15 000/t to \$16 000/t, more than 50% lower than the start of 2023.

The oversupply of low-quality nickel from Indonesia means the higher quality, but higher cost ore from Australian mines can not be competitive on the world market.

KordaMentha had received a lot of interest from overseas mining operators looking at potentially buying the Avebury nickel mine but these nickel prices make the chance of a white knight coming in to save the day highly unlikely.

Until low carbon, battery-grade nickel is valued accordingly Avebury and other high quality nickel mines around the world will be at a disadvantage.

It came as a shock to all at Avebury, including Mallee Resources Limited's managing director John Lamb as the decision was announced.

Driver mentor training on coast

The North West Driver Mentor Program has officially launched. The program will provide young people with access to a driver mentor to support them accrue the 80 hours required to sit their provisional driver's licence test.

Two driver mentors have been recruited and sessions are now available for young people aged between 16 and 24 who need to get their licence to pursue work and/or training opportunities.

A partnership between West North West Working (WNWW) and Youth, Family and Community Connections (YFCC) has resulted in this pilot program aimed at addressing one of the main barriers impacting young people accessing employment on the North West Coast.

The inability to obtain a driver's licence is a major barrier for young people trying to gain employment or training.

A survey conducted by WNWW in 2023 backed up the anecdotal evidence that not having a driver's licence has

long been an issue for young people, particularly in rural and remote areas of our State. Many jobs require a licence, and work is often found some distance from home and outside the availability of bus services.

76% of WNWW survey participants indicated they are impacted by barriers towards obtaining their licence. These barriers include having access to a suitable vehicle and finding someone to sit next to them while they build up their hours and the cost of lessons and driving tests.

The pilot program includes all areas of the North West, including the West Coast. A driver mentor is scheduled to travel to the West Coast once every 8 weeks.

Danielle Kidd, Program Manager of West North West Working said, "We are excited the program is scoped to deliver across our whole region, including the West Coast."

"The program is accessible to young people, and I encourage those who may

French traveller talks about cycling the West Coast



A few weeks ago, I disembarked the ferry in Devonport with my new travelling buddy, a gravel bike that I had purchased second-hand in order to travel around Tasmania. For some reason, I had decided to start with the West coast.

I must be honest here: I'm not a strong cyclist, I don't do well in cold and windy weather, and I feel miserable when it rains. It doesn't sound like a good start, but I really wanted to discover the famous rugged West Coast of Tassie, even if I had to suffer a bit to get there.

The first few days after I left Devon-

falling in love with the beauty of the region, the contrasts of colors, the ever-changing light, and the way the kelp shines in the sun. I also was fortunate enough to spend new year's eve there. Just a fire on the beach with a few other campers, a beautiful display of stars in the sky, and one of the most impressive moonrise that you can dream of.

I continued towards Arthur River, where I fell in love a bit more with this part of the world. Sometimes, I simply could not believe my eyes.

From there, I took the road through the Tarkine forest. One of the nice things about being a slow cyclist is that I had plenty of time to appreciate the beauty and the quiet of the forest. It a also a good way to enjoy wildlife, because you don't feel like a danger to animals crossing the streets or grazing on the sides.

Since I had to split the Tarkine drive in two days, I also found myself doing some hikes in the late afternoon or early morning, which means that I was the only human around, making the atmosphere really special.

After that, I "cheated" and took a bus to Strahan, before setting off for the next part of the journey: leaving the coast and crossing the plateau towards the East.

I will certainly remember the "99 bends" after Queenstown (luckily there was not much traffic in the early morning) and I was really happy about the

downhill afterwards! From there, I had a wonderful time cycling through the Franklin-Gordon rivers national park. The main downside was that I was leaving the West behind.

Thanks to this trip, I realized that Western Tasmania is a great place for cycling, as long as you get lucky with the weather. The roads are quiet, there are plenty of rivers to refill your water bottle, and the people you meet are amazing: people gave me water, chocolate, invited me for a coffee at their house, offered to let me camp in their garden, or simply gave me a hug...

I feel very grateful for all these acts of kindness and for this unforgettable trip.

Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

MAN WANDERS OFF FROM COMSTOCK HOTEL AT 2 a.m. BODY FOUND ALMOST TWO WEEKS LATER

Police at Zeehan were informed on Wednesday, 5 October 1910, that Michael Francis (Frank) O'Dea was missing after staying the previous Sunday night at the Comstock Hotel. O'Dea was described as a stout man of about 44, and was well known as a barman at both the Central and Club Hotels, Zeehan.

He was last seen about 2 o'clock on Monday morning when Mr Frank Thurstans, the proprietor, heard O'Dea walking about, who said he wanted to go outside as he was restless and could not sleep. About an hour later and about 200 yards closer to Zeehan a lady heard him walk past her house arguing with himself over which way he should

On the previous Saturday he had spoken about some mental health issues, and when he wasn't seen on the following Monday it was assumed he had either gone to see a doctor in Zeehan or returned to his camp. But after a few more days there was still no sign of him so the police were alerted.

Search parties were sent out for over a week but no trace was found until Sunday the 16th of October. It had been decided that day was to be the final day of searching and a large party of civilians, police and Boy Scouts went looking. Three men who were delayed and missed the official search party, Charles Connors, Charles Murphy, and John Cotton, found the partially clothed body only about 300 yards from the Hotel amongst dense timber and almost impenetrable scrub.

Later that afternoon the deceased's
coat and hat were
found about 30
yards away nearer
the Hotel, where
they had been placed
on a stump. The
body was removed
to Zeehan Hospital
and an inquest was
held the next day
at 3p.m. before Mr
E.V. Goldsmid.

After Sergeant Lonergan had formally thanked all those who had assisted with the search, Dr. Butler deposed

that he had examined the body and that there were no external marks of violence, but the throat, nose, portion of the ears, and other parts had been eaten away. O'Dea had also suffered from heart and kidney disease. The body was clothed only in a waistcoat, shirt, and singlet. These were all wet

through. Deceased had no trousers on, but his boots and socks were in a good condition. His opinion was that death was due to exposure and want of food, and had occurred at least 10 days before.

John McIntyre, a

woodcutter, stated

he knew the de-

ceased, who had

been living and

that O'Dea was

not in good health

when he first came

to the camp, but

he improved after

a while. He went

back to Zeehan, and

stayed there about a

fortnight. He then

returned, and, after

being at the camp

working with him

for about six weeks.

McIntyre also stated

Charlie Murphy and Charlie Connors, two of the three men who found O'Dea. (Tasmanian Mail, 27 October 1910.

witness noticed he was suffering from the effects of drink. On Sunday he had no boots on, and said he had spent the night in the bush. He was suffering from hallucinations. MacIntyre told O'Dea he could not keep him any longer, and took him to the Comstock Hotel about 6 o'clock on the Sunday

evening, and left him there for the night. O'Dea was wearing the hat and coat produced.


Frank Thurstans deposed that the deceased, with Mr McIntyre, came to his hotel on the Sunday evening. Deceased had been at the hotel earlier in the day, asking him to ring up Dr. Butler, and stating he had the "D.T.'s." O'Dea said he had been out all night. When O'Dea came the second time he had tea, and went to bed about 9.30p.m. He got up about an hour later, and witness put him back to bed. About 2 o'clock witness heard O'Dea again, who this time was fully dressed. Deceased said he could not sleep, and wanted to go outside. Following some discussion, Thurstans informed him that the front door was open, and he could come back in whenever he liked. He didn't see him again after that.

After hearing from some more witnesses the Coroner returned a verdict in line with the evidence. "Frank" O'Dea was buried later that afternoon. There is some doubt over his actual burial plot, but wherever he lies he does so without a headstone.

This advice is for parents to teach snake safety to their children.

Never touch a snake or lizard! snakes and lizards can be very grumpy and Pastoral Care Assistance at the following email: westcoast@aohtas.org.au

snakes can be dangerous. If you see a snake or a lizard there is no need to be afraid. They don't want to bite us. We are much bigger than they are. They just want to be left alone.

Teach your children snake safety

If you see a snake close to you, stop and stand still, do not panic and remain calm. Snakes react to sudden movement. That's why it's important to stand very still until the snake has moved on. When the snake has moved away from you slowly and calmly walk away. Tell a grown up like a parent or teacher or carer straightaway and showed the way you saw the snake.

If you see a snake well ahead of you do not panic standstill and slowly but very calmly back out of harm's way. If you're walking along with a snake and it's very close to you, follow the above advice, do not panic. take nice slow breaths, remain calm. they don't want to bite us but if we annoy them they will defend themselves. Children can also call out to their caregiver or parents 'SNAKE!" whilst still following the above, general advice.

Get all people and pets out of harm's way.

Call your local Snake Catcher. From a safe distance, keep an eye on where the snake is until the Snake Catcher arrives.







PROTECT WHAT YOU VALUE THIS BUSHFIRE SEASON

A message from the Tasmania Fire Service

There is nothing predictable about bushfire season, but what you can control is planning and preparing as well as possible. Ensuring you understand your bushfire risk and having a bushfire plan to match your circumstances is very important, and it is also critical to prepare your property as best you can. Read on to find out more about the TFS's recommended 8 aspects to property preparedness.

1. Defendable Space

Defendable space is a 20m-30m area around your home where the vegetation is managed to reduce the intensity of any potential bushfires. The radius of defendable space increases with the degree of slope your house might be on, and for some, your defendable space boundary may reach into neighbouring property, meaning it's important to work with neighbours to ensure your property is bushfire ready.

2. Vegetation Management & Landscaping

Managing vegetation is critical to property preparedness. It will reduce the chance of direct flame contact, impact of radiant heat, and protect your home from ember attack. This includes the types of plants you have around your home, where they are situated and being smart about garden beds against your home, as well as other considerations.

3. Water Supply

Water supply is crucial to preparing your property so that you can ensure it is defendable during a bushfire incident. Before leaving early, you may choose to defend your property. But once you are gone it is important that your local brigade can access water to fight any fires impacting your property.

4. Access

There isn't a fire truck to defend every home, but there may be a situation where your property needs one during an emergency, so you need to make sure they can find you and get in!

A truck should be able to identify your property, get through your driveway, and turn around safely and quickly to leave. If fire fighters see any risk in entering your property, they will move on.

5. Building Improvements

You may need to make improvements to your property to ensure it has a strong defence against bushfire. Ember proofing will be your main consideration and you should look to seal any gaps in your roof, windows, vents or deck.

6. Maintenance Activities

Prior to and during the bushfire season there are maintenance activities that can help keep your property bushfire ready. These are tasks such as keeping your gutters clean, raking leaves around the property, trimming bushes and maintaining firefighting equipment.

7. Awareness of Personal Capacity to Defend Your Property

Your physical and psychological capacity needs to be considered when making your bushfire plan. Our strong advice is always to leave early. However, if you decide to stay and defend, please understand that it will be hot, scary, tiring, hard to see and difficult to breath.

8. Potential Hazards


Always be aware of potential hazards on your property. Whether it be you or responding firefighters at your home, you need to ensure everyone can move around

as safely as possible. This includes gas, electricity supply, firewood storage, etc.

Preparing your property can be a big task, and it is important to understand your personal capacity to complete tasks. You may need to work with family, friends and neighbours to assist, however at the end of the day, be mindful you can only do as much as practical. Regardless of what you can complete, make sure you have a plan to leave early in a bushfire incident, keeping you and your family safe.
