A dose of fresh air for West coasters

Tasmania's west coast Neighbourhood Houses have received a timely air quality boost, with a donation of air purifier units thanks to Asthma Australia's partnership with Rentokil Initial and the support of Neighbourhood Houses Tasmania.

The units have been donated by Rentokil Initial to the majority of Neighbourhood Houses across the state, where they will help support people with asthma and other respiratory conditions that are made worse by poor air quality.

Zeehan Neighbourhood Centre manager Mel Sullivan says the units mean Houses can provide a healthier space for locals with asthma, providing essential support to people in their local community.

Asthma Australia Health Projects and Partnerships Coordinator in Tasmania, Jess Tyler, says the air purifiers are an important ingredient in providing a safe, clean air space, especially on smoky or high pollen days.

"Bushfire smoke and pollens pose significant health challenges for those with hay fever and asthma, making it important for Tasmanians with these conditions to stay alert throughout the season and seek 'air shelter' if needed."

Rentokil Initial in Tasmania says that the partnership reflects a shared commitment to improving air quality and supporting the health and well-being of communities across Tasmania.

"We are proud to see the InspireAir 72 air purifiers being offered through Asthma Australia to Tasmania's Neighbourhood Houses.

Work to complete repairs to the Zeehan Swimming Pool have been progressing well this year:

- the deep end concrete floor has stablised and reinforced
- new pipework has been pressure tested
- concrete will be poured in the coming days
- following the concrete pour the new vinyl liner will be installed

We are working towards a completion date for the pool of early March. When the new changerooms have been completed and inspected by the building surveyor the pool will then be operational.

Once completed the pool infrastructure will have been completely upgraded, including placement of a disability hoist for those patrons who may have mobility

Along with the community we are keen to see the finished product and enjoy a swim in the pool.



This ship has sailed... or has it?

We came together, jubilant strangers. We were ushered to fill a seaside, creative space on the land of the Palawa People. We're all here, to hear an irreverent, true story of potential piracy and plunder.

The gentle (strangely familiar) scent of Huon pine is relished. The sea breeze tickles the skin, reminding us we're inside/outside. The impressive set consists of extensive timber and polished, perfected props. The mood is expectant: we Aussies love a story about sticking it to the man!

The stage is set: an enthusiastic audience participating with an improvised Pink Panther theme. The phrase "promised pantomime" is wielded early-(whoops-no: "pants are mine" apparently).

We, the audience, know what we're in for! (And just because you're in the

back row, don't think you'll escape any breaking-fourth-wall shenanigans from the eagle-eyed actors, as I discovered). Both children and older men in the audience are enlisted, in supporting roles, replete with (freshly sanitised) props. The sheer delight of this experience is obvious to all, though some embraced their roles with more abandon than others.

The girl who played the cat embodied her skittish ways perfectly! Youngsters remind us how to improvise. No Fear! I mean....how WOULD a cat, on a boat, out at sea, FEEL? A tad TETCHY, me thinks! And don't get me started about the spray bottles and trigger-happy pre-teens! Key phrases were repeated by the audience, at various intervals. Notably: "Liberty-OR DEATH!" with ever increasing gusto!



A comedic request for dramatic tension via "creeping in time to the music" means educational content is met and all age groups are suitably entertained. Nice.

Any home-schooling parent could include a visit as part of the fam's creative and performing arts mandatory hours. And the HSIE content means it ticks a few boxes, eh what? A clever use of timber costume/sets (and the talent and versatility of the actor that played them), meant other (occasional) characters were convincing! (And who wouldn't want to play a drunken' sailor ear-lie in the mornin')?

The phrase "admiralty law" is flexed, towards the end. The players are embroiled in a court hearing where words and their meanings are scrutinised. (A timely lesson for all, in the importance of knowing "common law").

The ship is effectively "ghosted" by its own bureaucratic bungling! Tardy record-keeping saves the day! Perhaps this old tale will prove useful as a blueprint for freedom.

The dedication of the performers to the story and its legacy was clear, when it was announced that all actors were part of past or present father/daughter performance teams.

My own father introduced me to a love of theatre, so this fact resonates, especially.

Also, as a creative and performing arts teacher for more than twenty five years, I am a passionate advocate for the wonders of creative collaboration, for shared healing and healthy communities.

More please! More! Encore, encore! Here's to another thirty one years!





Grants bolster small businesses | Phil Vickers retires

Builders, distillers, cafes and a swim school are among the businesses to benefit from a round of Tasmanian Government grants aimed at supporting small business.

Minister for Hospitality and Small Business, Jane Howlett, said the Enabling Small Business Grant program was very popular, with the grants applications fulfilled within 24 hours of opening.

"The \$1 million Enabling Small Business Grants program provided up to \$10,000 to eligible businesses for capital purchases," Minister Howlett said.

"This includes things such as new technology, small-scale manufacturing equipment, computers or electronic payments terminals.

"The successful applicants were required to contribute at least 30 per cent towards the total capital purchase cost."

Minister Howlett said key to the Tasmanian Government's 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future was supporting our State's small businesses, who are the backbone of the economy.

"These grants highlight the benefits of 2026 Small Business Growth Strategy and are producing real and tangible outcomes for small businesses across Tasmania," the Minister said.

West Coast Paddle Club report

I joined the West Coast Paddle Club late last year as I was really keen to get out onto the amazing waterways surrounding Queenstown. Paddle Club week in early Jan gave me the opportunities I was waiting for.

On Sunday 12th Jan, the kayak trip started at Macquarie Heads, paddling across the waterway known as Hells Gates to Cape Sorell. I had always thought Hells Gates was named because of the dangerous mix of tide, waves, strong winds and river water flowing out of the harbour creating whirl pools, eddies and strong currents to mess with incoming or outgoing boats.

And there are plenty of shipwreck stories to back up that idea, but no, apparently it was so named by the convicts coming to the penal settlement on Sarah Island, their point of "entrance to Hell". Anyways we were blessed with modest wind and tide conditions so paddled successfully across via Bonnet Island.

Although we tried to cut through the Macquarie Heads breakwater to get to Pilot Bay, the tide was too low and we aborted that idea. We pulled up our kayaks on Outer Bay instead, then bush bashed our way across the land to Pilot Bay for our picnic and swim.

The Breakwater is one of the late 19th century feats of engineering – and was built to help keep the channel into Macquarie Harbour free of silt so the ships could make it across the entrance

when going by ship was the only way to export the Mt Lyell copper.

Although the return paddle was a little more testing against the tide, we made it back successfully, packed the kayaks onto the vehicles and headed back to Queenstown feeling well exercised and content after a good day on the water.

On Tuesday 14th Jan – Paul and I set off in a double kayak across the southern part of Lake Burbury towards the gorge where the Governor River enters the lake. It took us just over an hour to paddle there, and omg, what a gorgeous day it was for a paddle. Sunshine, blue skies, hardly any wind, and we had the place to ourselves. Can it get any better than that?



I caught up with Jen from the 'Nature Connection Project' at the Mt Lyell Picnic the other week and asked for more information about her project. This is what she sent me.

How Australians experience a sense of connection with nature, and the impacts of that connection, are the questions at the heart of The Nature Connection Project.

This University of Tasmania-led research is born from Australia's Strategy for Nature, with its Number One Goal "To Connect All Australians To Nature". However, the majority of nature connection research has happened overseas, and there are some real gaps in our understanding in the Australian context. The Nature Connection Storytelling Pod This is where The Nature Connec-

tion Project steps in. Firstly the project analysed a national survey completed by just over 4000 Australians from diverse backgrounds. The results show, among other insights, that those who identify as being strongly connected to nature are 81 times more likely to engage in 'pro-environmental' behaviours than people who report having low levels of connection.

Statistics such these are important in giving broad, sweeping understandings, but the project also wants to gain deeper insights into the complexities of human connection with non-human nature. The second part of the research is therefore focussed on gathering stories of people's experiences in nature.

Stories like 'Grey Fantail'



"This photo was taken at the end of the most difficult year of my life. Watching this young grey fantail fledgling reminded me that there was light at the end of the tunnel, that I had not only survived unimaginable emotional, psychological, and financial abuse ... I had healed from long-term chronic pain and had made a new life for myself. It was almost a new year, a new beginning, just like for this young little fantail fledgling".

Most of us have had moments that awaken a feeling of connection with other living or non-living things around us. If you have a story, photo, poem, painting or other creative offering of connection that you want to share, please visit the project website at www. thenatureconnectionproject.com.au/

The project also has a mobile inflatable pod that can be brought to festivals and events to gather nature connection stories. By analysing these creative contributions, the project team will gain greater insights into Australians' relationship with nature. These understandings will be used to inform environmental and wellbeing policies, and create nature connection resources, tools, articles and understandings.

It's always a great day out when you drop in to the Waratah Woodchopping Carnival and this one was no exception.











































Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

the Montagu Hall in Zeehan on the evening of Tuesday 6 September, 1898 after a meeting of the Zeehan Gymnastic and Literary Club. The club had been formed just a little while before as a source of recreation for the young men of Zeehan during the evenings, and it had become quite popular.

that night. Originally from Dunedin in New jured. Zealand where he had won prizes for drawing at the Dunedin School of Art and Design, he came to Zeehan where his brother was living, and worked at "The Zeehan and Dundas Herald" as a compositor before going mining. He was just three weeks short of his 23rd birthday and according to reports, a fine athletic youth.

Although it was his first evening in attendance, it was observed that he was quite experienced when it came to exercising on the horifeet above the floor. After the gymnastics training session under the supervision of instructors had finished, Cameron continued trying some exercises on his own, as some others were also doing. Both the supervisors were no longer in attendance as a committee meeting was taking place in an adjoining room.

Cameron was performing a feat known as the "Spread–eagle foot wheel [at that time at least] where he was circling the bar, with his hands gripping it and his feet resting on it. This exercise, though quite difficult was by no means an uncommon one, nor was it considered very dangerous. Apparently, Cameron had said nearby "I should not try this because my arms feel cramped from doing too much on the first ry prevention method was the use of "spotters,"

stood by to watch the exercise which he performed successfully, and they then stood aside for Cameron to dismount. > Dr. Kennedy was sent for, and he arrived quickly, and found that Cameron's body was completely paralysed and numbed to all feeling from the feet to the chest, and he diagnosed a dislocation of the spine a few inches below the neck. Cameron was able to talk as usual, but had no feeling. He was not suffering the slightest pain, but was simply numbed. The doctor ordered his removal to the hospital.

Cameron remained lying in the hospital, zontal bar, which was mounted about seven quite helpless, until he succumbed to his injuries on the following Thursday afternoon about 5 o'clock. He was conscious from the time of the accident up until within an hour or so of

> For reasons which are unknown today there was no Coronial Enquiry into his death, which was unusual. Fortunately, there were two letters sent to the Editor of "The Zeehan and Dundas Herald" which provide some insight.


