Take West Zeehan for example, after 140 years of mining we still have open stagnant drains and no sewage, most of the mining royalties have continuously been syphoned off and spent elsewhere and I disagree with what the columnist said about the mining royalties in the Mercury.

The reason we have a declining west coast is because the mines have adopted a 12 hour 4 panel shift rosters and they advertise the jobs as drive in and drive out, 7 on 7 off, so those who travel from far away do nothing other than eat work and sleep, then when rostered off they're gone and they have taken the money with them with very little support for our mining towns.

The locals refer to them as seagulls. So, for the west coasters living elsewhere you ask what they are doing for the mining towns, answer: very little they have become seagulls.

The only way to encourage people with young families back to live on the west coast is for the mines to bring back the 8 hour shifts 40-hour week that will require more employees and more housing. This will be a lot healthier than working a 84 hour week and until that happens, which it won't, the mining towns on the west coast will remain

The Government should improve services for example Zeehan could do with a full-time residential Doctor a Nursing Home and a fully enclosed heated swimming pool and for the council to stop charging exorbitant amounts of rates and do something about cleaning up west Zeehan.

Simple basic services like that may deter people from leaving and maybe

encourage people to move back, after all Zeehan is the central hub of the west coast and we are surrounded by 4 fully operational and profitable mines. Oh, and one stagnant copper mine.

It is important in any Annual Plan that priorities are clearly identified and have appropriate resources allocated that allow them to be achieved. The number of priorities or projects that are included in the Annual Plan will be limited to ensure that they are achievable within the financial year. This means that it is important to identify both areas where Council should do more, and areas where Council can do less. New ideas cannot be implemented without finding savings or increasing revenue.

To help guide Council in setting invites input from the Community. Priorities and projects should be linked to the West Coast Community Plan 2025 and other strategies adopted by Council. These documents can be found on our website and are available at our office. Ideas not linked to strategies are less likely to be included in the Annual Plan.

Teepookana ahead!



West Coast Wilderness Railway's summer is steaming ahead with double daily departures of the Lynchford Express undertaken throughout most of January, whilst the Rail and Infrastructure teams ready the Strahan side for departures from February 27, 2024.

Strahan's newest experience, the Teepookana and the King experience will be a 2.5-hour return journey to Lower Landing, serviced by the newly refurbished Drewry Locomotive No. 1 (D1).

"We're excited to be heading back into the rainforest in February and the team are creating new experiences, such as a guided flora walk for passengers at Lower Landing," says Ian Robertson, WCWR General Manager.

"The Lynchford experience from Queenstown has been well received as a heritage rail experience and very busy throughout January, however, there is still demand for a strong wilderness journey and we believe the Strahan experience will fit this niche very well for now," says Mr. Robertson.

The Teepookana and the King experience is scheduled to depart at 10:00am, Monday to Friday from Regatta Point Station. Prices start at \$55 per adult in a Heritage Carriage and \$95 in a Wilderness Carriage.

Work on the middle section of the railway between Lower Landing and Lynchford is ongoing.

Have your say on salmon farming

Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek her decision have our say, rather than announced a review of salmon farming in Macquarie Harbour. This review is examining the decision to expand farming in the harbour (although levels are now much lower than at the height of the expansion).

The outcome of the review could have significant negative consequences for Strahan and the West Coast and it is vital that all of us stand up for our community.

The Council will be putting in a submission outlining the impacts of the Ministers decision on our community, but ask all to consider doing the same.

It is important that we the people on the West Coast, those most affected by those in the big cities that are noisy but are not impacted.

munity with mountain bike trails on its doorstep. We have constructed this pump track with the local kids in mind and it is best suited to bikes with wheels up to 26 inches.

As well as an important place for skills development, the Pump Track creates a space for residents to come together, stay active, and enjoy the great outdoors. It's an investment in the health and happiness of our community and

The Pump Track is a result of true community collaboration. It's inspiring to see local businesses, community organisations, and the Council come together to create something that will benefit our residents. While the track was primarily delivered by volunteers of the West Coast MTB Club, a large number of local organisations and businesses played a part in its realisation. The Queenstown Lions Club firstly initiated the project, while Williams Earthmoving Queenstown and Gaspersics Contracting played pivotal roles in the construction, providing materials, equipment and expertise. Council is the land owner and have granted a license to the Club to develop and manage the facility. Soggy Brolly contributed the signage design.

We have initially constructed the track out of gravel and hope to take on

feedback from local kids and riders on what they like and what they'd like to see more of. We are lucky in that this approach gives us the creative freedom to modify and add to the track before we to the community, it stands not only as seek to get it surfaced down the track hopefully.

The opening of the track saw a remarkable turnout despite the stifling heat. Senator Anne Urquhart attended to officially inaugurate the pump track by cutting a red ribbon, after which a stream of kids on bikes eagerly flooded through. The event featured a celebra-



tory barbecue, generously sponsored by Evans IGA Supermarket, and cooked by the Queenstown Lions Club.

As the Queenstown Pump Track opens a space for riders but also as a commitment to the development of the West Coast as a mountain biking centre - a vision born of and nurtured by the dedicated spirit of our community.

Regional Learning Pathways WEST COAST & CIRCULAR HEAD



SKILLS | TRAINING | EDUCATION | PATHWAYS | SUCCESS

This trial project was funded in 2023 by Skills Tasmania and aimed to provide opportunities for West Coast and Circular Head residents to discover more about current and emerging learning and work opportunities in the regions, as well as provide supported learning to develop professional skills needed to access and participate in the workforce, regardless of industry.

A series of free sessions delivered in familiar, local and accessible venues provided local experiences and learning opportunities relevant to health, caring and social assistance, tourism and hospitality, mining, information technology, agriculture, and renewable energy.



Project details

Who

The project was for West Coast and Circular Head residents aged 18+ who were not currently undertaking learning or work, or those seeking to upskill or enhance work and/or learning opportunities. In 2023 over 80 people registered for the program, with participants from:

How

To encourage participation, the project team actively engaged with the community to learn directly from residents about what would enable their participation.

Working in partnership with local industries and education providers, such as Study Hub West Coast, Study Centre Circular Head, West North West Working, Libraries Tasmania and the UTAS Short Courses and CODES teams, RLP sessions were delivered using a traumainformed, strengths-based approach in working with participants to highlight their existing skills, skills they wanted to work on, and the steps to get there.

Reducing barriers to participation was a key focus, with consideration given to factors such as timing and location of sessions, and offering an inclusive, supportive and positive learning environment.

To reframe the commonly held perception that learning must be assessed, sessions did not include formal assessment tasks.

Pathways

The project team worked with participants to map out a pathway for further learning, paid work or volunteering opportunities specific to their interests, and provided further information or referral to other programs, courses, resources or services within the community as needed.

Project learnings

- There is demand for place-based non-accredited learning opportunities offered in local, accessible and familiar environments as a stepping stone to formal learning.
- The use of social media can be an effective way to promote, recruit and communicate with participants.
- Connecting with and investing in relationships with course participants is powerful in shaping learner confidence and aspirations.
- All people have existing skills that can be useful in new and emerging learning and work opportunities.
- The ability to adapt and be flexible to the changing needs of participants, and the broader community is central in supporting regional Tasmanians in taking their next step.

Project outcomes

The impact this program has had on building learning pathways for regional Tasmanians is reflected in receiving the 2023 Community Engagement Award for the University of Tasmania, Academic Division.

Project evaluations have shown several key outcomes for participants:

- An increase in confidence to seek further learning or paid work because of participating in the program.
- Participants reported learning new and relevant skills.
- Participants broadened their knowledge of the types of skills needed and work available across industries in each region
- Over 95% of participants have gone on to paid work or have enrolled in, or completed, some form of learning/study.

- Certificate III in Aged Care
- Responsible Service of Alcohol
- First Aid
- Workplace computing
- Introduction to Barista Skills

- Mastering Emails
- Conflict Management & Resolution short course
- Time Management, Planning & Organisation short course
- Resume writing and cover letter skills
- Understanding Dementia short course
- Bachelor of Social Work

Participants have gained employment locally in Retail, Disability, Aged care, Childcare, Agriculture (dairy), and Security.

What next?

This program can be adjusted to suit the needs of any community where there may be parriers to participating in learning and work.

Explore the community, discover the resources, people, skills and knowledge already in place, be flexible in the approach to delivering programs and building partnerships, and a program that is place-based and driven by the people can be successful.

The Tasmanian salmon aquaculture industry will partner with the Australian Government's Fisheries Research & Development Corporation (FRDC), in a major initiative to stimulate dissolved oxygen levels in Macquarie Harbour.

This program is called the Macquarie Harbour Oxygenation Project or MHOP for short.

The Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies (IMAS) will lead the scientific evaluation program to assess the efficacy and environmental response to the oxygenation. This evaluation will be critical in assessing the feasibility and scalability of the system.

The Macquarie Harbour Oxygenation Project (MHOP) will run over two years in a Tasmania-first trial of engineering solutions to enhance oxygen levels in a major waterway. Salmon Tasmania CEO, Luke Martin, said the project could cost up to \$6 million over the next two years and represented the industry's major contribution to the Maugean Skate Conservation Recovery Plan, and would further elevate the sustainability principles underpinning aquaculture in the harbour.

"The salmon industry has been operating out of Macquarie Harbour for 37 years and the people who work of this industry care deeply about the marine environment they live and work within every day," Mr Martin said.

"The industry has been raising concerns about the decline in the Maugean Skate for some time and funded much of the research into the species.

'It's important to recognise there are a range of factors influencing the oxygen levels in the Harbour and the decline of the skate, which is widely accepted as now extinct in Bathurst Harbour where there is obviously no aquaculture.

'The industry has also more than halved its biomass levels in Macquarie Harbour since 2017, and this has had no apparent impact on the dissolved oxygen levels in the water system. Clearly the issues are far more complex than simply removing the salmon.

Mr Martin said the Australian Government had recently announced funding for the establishment of a captive breeding program, as recommended by its Species Conservation Task Force.

"We will now take the lead in the second priority outlined by that Task Force: an initiative to directly improve the oxygen levels in the harbour to support the Skate and further offset the impact of our operations on the marine environment," Mr Martin said.

'The only thing removing the aquaculture from the Harbour is certain to achieve is the total and unacceptable devastation of the West Coast community, with economic shockwaves and the loss of hundreds of jobs right across Northern and North-West Tasmania. With no surety this would make any difference for the Skate.

'These oxygenation projects are proven to work in other marine environments, and is potentially a long-term solution to improve the harbour for the skate, and secure the economic lifeblood of a number of communities.

'We can strike a balance here between conservation outcomes and the economic and social wellbeing of regional Tasmania, and the industry is determined to lead this path.



Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

TALES FROM THE ZEEHAN GENERAL (PIONEER) CEMETERY. MUCH LOVED AND ADMIRED YOUNG SCHOOL TEACHER PASSES AWAY

On Friday, February 14, 1913, at the Zeehan District Hospital, Eleanor Rosamond Millnott (Nellie) Barker, dearly beloved eldest daughter of Alfred Herbert and Helen Margaret Barker, passed away aged just 19 years and 6 months. She had been taken to the hospital some three weeks before, and had been suffering from a number of ailments, against which she had fought bravely, and, although she had rallied on several occasions, there was very little hope from the beginning of her illness.

Nellie was very well known and liked by a large circle of friends. She was born in Zeehan and educated at the East Zeehan State School. As a child she was an accomplished singer, and like most females of those times, good at sewing. In 1910 she passed the examination entitling her to enter the Teacher Training College at Hobart, where she studied diligently, and after two years there she was appointed teacher at the school where she received her primary education. In addition to this, she was involved with the Presbyterian Church as a Sunday School teacher.

She continued her studies in the matriculation course at the Zeehan School of Mines evening classes. After the University examinations in November 1912, she became ill, and as her condi-

tion gradually became worse, causing grave fears, she was admitted to the Zeehan hospital on the 21st of January where an operation by Dr. Terence

Butler revealed the full seriousness of her condition. Despite however, the most unremitting care and nursing, she gradually sank, passing away peacefully at about 6.30 in the evening on Valentine's Day. The exact nature of her illness was not recorded in the newspaper. Nellie was of a sensitive and loving nature, and popular with her students and her fellow teachers.

Nellie's funeral took place on the following Sunday afternoon at 3:30. Before the funeral

left her parents' house in Hunter Street (which was in the area of Stops Street and Fowler Street), a short and impressive service was held by the Reverend C.W.T. Headen, and at the graveside he was assisted in the burial service by the Reverend C.C. Dugan, M.A. The cortege was headed by the members

> of the United Ancient Order of Druids, (the U.A.O.D.) where her father was an adherent, the pall-bearers being fellow-employees of her father at "The Zeehan and Dundas Herald" office. About sixty children of the Presbyterian Sunday School and scholars from her State School class followed carrying the floral tributes.

The very large attendance of about 500 people (about 10% of the total population

of Zeehan at the time) was an eloquent testimony of sympathy with the bereaved parents; and the many beautiful wreaths and crosses of flowers sent by friends gave silent expression to the general feeling of sorrow at the early demise of a young life so full of promise forever to be unfulfilled.

"The Zeehan and Dundas Herald" compiled a list of 75 families or individuals who sent wreaths, and there were several more from school children whose names they were unable to ascertain.

That evening at the service held in the Presbyterian Church the Reverend C.W.T. Headen again referred in feeling terms to their departed sister, and the "Dead March in Saul" was played by the organist, Miss Jennie Reid, while the congregation remained standing.

Sadly, the exact whereabouts of Nellie's grave isn't known today, due to record keeping errors in the past 110 years. She is certainly buried in what was the Presbyterian section amongst the trees to the left of the main entrance road to the cemetery, but her plot number as recorded is probably incorrect.

Information can be provided to police on 131 444 or Crime Stoppers Tasmania. You can stay anonymous.


North West Driver Mentor Program Launch

A message from Tullah Neighbourhood Watch & your West Coast Fire Brigades

As the days get increasingly hotter and our risk for bushfire increases, it is incredibly important that we keep a close eye on our local bushfire risk. Knowing our bushfire risk allows us to understand how we can appropriately plan, prepare and act ahead of, or during a bushfire emergency. This will ultimately help you keep yourself and your family safe.

What are the signs of bushfire risk that you can pay attention to?

Most of us get out and about during a lovely, sunny morning and that is just the opportunity take notice of the signs of bushfire risk. Whether it be walking the dog, heading to grab the paper, or pottering around the garden, you can pay attention to some key things to ensure you're ahead of the game when it comes to bushfire. Quite simply it's about taking note of the wind, the temperature, humidity levels and also consider the time of year you are in. For example, this year, bushfire season is demonstrating evidence of arriving a little earlier than usual, and it is important that we are all aware of that. Understanding these factors will help you develop an idea for what kind of day you might be in for, and then take the time to back this up with key resources available from the Tasmania Fire Service.

What are the resources available to view bushfire risk?

The Australian Fire Danger Rating System is an excellent place to start. This resource is designed to tell you just how dangerous a fire could be if one started in your area. We can never predict when or where a fire will start, but we do have some great measures for how bad things could be, allowing you to make bushfire planning decisions accordingly. The greatest thing about our newly updated Australian Fire Dangers Rating System is that it now comes with calls to action, meaning you know exactly how you should act depending on the rating provided.

Once a bushfire has started, we then have the Australian Warning System in place to provide critical alerts and warnings. These are to help you keep up to date with the incident, allowing you to take early action. The Australian Warning System is a user-friendly resource that is now consistent no matter the emergency, whether it be flood, storm, fire or anything else, and you will see the same icons providing you with important information regarding the incident. To keep up to date with the alerts and warnings in Tasmania, please ensure you become familiar TASALERT, which now features a new map for easy engagement and access to information. You can find this via https://alert.tas.gov.au/.

To ensure you have a complete idea of your bushfire risk, it is important to familiarise yourself with this information which can be found in many different places, inclusive of those mentioned above. However, to keep it simple, for all fire safety information, warnings and updates, please refer to the Tasmania Fire Service at www.fire.tas.gov.au or by listening to your local ABC radio emergency broadcaster.
