

Some things in life just don't feel right- a recent Council decision may have been legal in their eyes but to the constituents they are here to represent....a boiling anger and disgust is bubbling away for many in our community.

The reason for this angst and disgust can be found in Strahan due to details which have come to light about the sale of the iconic, arguably most prestigiously valuable, piece of historic and community waterfront asset available on the West Coast- The sale of the USCCO building for many simply does not pass the 'pub test'.

The closed Council meetings and barely respected views of the local community by the former GM and Councillors only adds to mistrust and resentment and is perceived as a deliberate act of shrouding the process to sell off this community valued piece of property.

If the community had known that the Council would sell their community asset for such a low price instead of presenting Council with a concept plan for its future development, community would have taken steps to purchase the building off Council (who were only the caretakers for the Strahan community in the first place) and access available State and Commonwealth funds to purchase and start the remodelling program. In keeping with community vision and aspirations. It was very clear to Council that the community wanted the USSCO Building to remain in community hands.

Now finding that Council sold the community property for a mere \$150k when it was base valued at more than \$550k does little to instil confidence and only increases outrage and upset over the lack of public transparency in the governance and management decisions made by the West Coast and its Councillors... These factors make the sale of USSCO building a pretty bitter pill to

It also raises concern over ethical and questionable practice and decisions by

elected representatives. ..that's where the dilemma lies.

It raises the question over the entire process and decision-making process. It also raises the question of just who are our elected representatives? Who are they really representing? Are they really up to the job of being Mayor and Councillors to make sound governance decisions based on the wants needs and important community values held dear by the people of the West Coast.

The new owners of the USCCO building- must be laughing all the way to the

The whole decision feels duplicitous and lacking in sound governance transparency.



MHOP UPDATE

During the early stages of the trial a total of 500kg of oxygen per day was injected, with a subsequent increase to 720kg per day for the remainder of the seven-day trial. The injected oxygen dispersed rapidly at depth as predicted by the modelling.

Environmental monitoring throughout the trial has collected an abundance of ecological and environmental data, and the scientific observations and analysis confirmed that there were no responses of concern. Nutrient and heavy metal concentrations in the water column remained unchanged from before, during and after the trial and the sediments were not disturbed.

Consequently, scientists have commenced the second stage of the project which will increase the oxygen load delivered each day from 1000 to 1500kg per day. The oxygen discharge system continues to perform well with

the oxygen dispersing rapidly at the intended depth.

Looking ahead, the next stage will increase the load and duration and explore further modifications of the delivery system to enhance operational effectiveness. Real-time sensor data and camera monitoring will complement scheduled sampling activities, providing comprehensive insights into the project's evolution and impact.

IMAS' Associate Professor and project lead Dr Jeff Ross said "We are really encouraged by the environmental performance of the oxygenation system after the first trial and we have seen further improvements already in the second trial in response to the engineering enhancements.

"The current trial will see our oxygen addition approaching 2 tonnes per day in the final week, and looking ahead, we will

continue to work with the engineers on improving the operational efficiency of the delivery system as we scale up" said Dr Ross.

Matt Barrenger, Technical Director for Salmon Tasmania recognised the ingenuity and adaptiveness of the operational teams. "A large team from across multiple companies have been working alongside and collaboratively with the scientists on this project and they are to be applauded said Matt Barrenger, Technical Director for Salmon Tasmania.

"This project has been implemented in a very short timeframe and as we all know the West Coast conditions can be challenging at the best of times. It is a real testament to their professionalism and experience," said Mr Barrenger.

The results from first trial will be published by IMAS in the coming weeks.



A Morning with Author Patsy Crawford by Robyn Wilson for West **Coast Libraries**

At 10:30 am on Monday 6th May at the Queenstown Library a group of over thirty-five people (aged from babes in prams to a youthful 94-yearold) met to hear Deloraine based Tasmanian author Patsy Crawford (pictured below), share stories and answer questions about her latest book Boys Home.

The aims of this event were to- engage community; enable universal access to our collections; connect people to information; champion lifelong learning and strengthen organisational effectiveness.

The book cover design gives a hint to the storyline- The Great Western Tiers, a dog and the red poppies of the Great War and Flanders Fields.

The programme for the morning included an introduction to Patsy and her previous six works that include the genre of non-fiction, fiction, and short stories. The Track Cutter (2020) is one of her most circulated and well-known titles.

Patsy is a Tasmanian writer who majored in History with the University of Tasmania. She has also previously worked in the field of journalism.

I was fortunate to function as MC for this event and having read the book was able to discuss with the audience (without disclosing the full details and ending) in introducing Patsy and Boys Home.

Patsy gave an authentic and entertaining talk encouraging the audience to 'have a go at self-publishing if you think you have a story in you.' She also discussed the concepts, themes, and characters in the book. Surprisingly, I learned that one of the main characters was based on the history of her father. himself a resident of a Home for boys.

Although names have been changed in this work of fiction, Patsy has engaged the reader with accurate details of local and international history. We found the discussion led to revealing the themes of redemption, mental and physical health post war and abandonment, domestic violence, the rights of a child, mateship, and kindness amongst others.

Patsy took questions from the keenly engaged audience who were interested to know how and where she got her inspiration and what her next book might be about.

We thank all who attended including the editor of the Western Echo, Alan for coming along to take pictures of the event. Thankyou also to Jane Delaney-John the West Coast Library Literacy coordinator for putting budget funds towards a sumptuous home-made style morning tea by local café JJ. Tales from a Zeehan graveya

HOME FOR LUNCH WHILE WORKING AT THE HOTEL CECIL, MAN COLLAPSES IN HIS GARDEN

Mr William Claus Colson was born at Brunswick, Victoria, on August 10, 1863. In 1895 he played four games of football with the Carlton Football Club in the V.F.A., and the next year he came to Zeehan. After his arrival on the West Coast he played cricket, and he was also considered the father of the Silver King football team, based at Zeehan.

On Monday, 19 February 1917, the residents of Zeehan were shocked to learn of his sudden death.

The deceased had been engaged by Mr J.G. Martin to set a cooking range at the Hotel Cecil, and on that day was working with Mr Albert Dwyer at the hotel. They left the Cecil about 12 o'clock to go home for lunch, and to prepare some ironwork. He was at his home at 15 Bayley Street when he passed away. He was survived by his wife Eliza, five sons (Charles, Stuart, William, Norman and Septimus) and two daughters (Elsie and Doris).

A coronial enquiry was held at the Courthouse the following afternoon. Septimus deposed that his father had not been in good health since a mining accident about three years ago. He was in hospital for several weeks after that accident, which rendered him unconscious for a fortnight. During the last three weeks he had been complaining of pains around the shoulders and across

the chest. He sometimes complained of shortness of breath. On the day prior to his passing he had complained of feeling ill. On the Monday he had a little breakfast, but did not complain of feeling unwell. He added his father smoked a good deal, but rarely drank alcohol. At lunchtime Septimus was inside until alerted by his sisters Elsie (19) and Doris

(8) calling out that their father was lying down. He asked Mr Dwyer to come and see what the matter was with his father. Then he went for the doctor. Mr Lee arrived just as he was

Elsie May Colson said her father had been complaining about his health for about a fortnight. He did not feel very

well on Sunday. On the Monday he went to work about 8:30 and returned about 12 o'clock. He had nothing to eat or drink when he came home. He went into Mr Dwyer's for a pair of snips, and cut some tin at the back of the house. Later he came in and got a broom.

A little while later Doris called out "Father won't speak to me, and he is lying on the flowerbed." She went outside and called out for her brother, and got some water. Her father never moved or spoke, and she did not think he was breathing. His eyes and mouth were wide open, and his face was a little on the blue side. Thomas Lee said between 12 and 1 o'clock on Monday he was walking home when he heard Elsie Colson crying. She was kneeling beside her father who was lying on the ground. He ran to where they were and he noticed Mr Colson was breathing, and he opened his



eyes once but did not speak. Mr Dwyer and he carried Mr Colson into the shade. The two men worked Mr Colson's arms up and down in an attempt to resuscitate him. Before very long Dr. Anderson arrived and told them he was beyond help. Albert Woodren Dwyer deposed that he lived next door to the deceased. The first he knew of his serious condition was when Doris Colson came and said, "Father is lying down in the garden, with his eyes open and he won't speak to me." He told her to run away, as he believed her father was playing with her. Two

or three minutes later Septimus Colson came and said "Will you come and see father; there is something the matter with him." He told Septimus to run for a doctor, and then ran next door. He found the deceased lying on the ground and assisted Mr Lee to move him and resuscitate him.

Dr. Eugene Anderson said he received an urgent call on Monday, at 12.40, to go to the residence of the deceased. Upon arrival he found life extinct. His medical records state that he had been treated for heart disease for at least 12 months. Having heard the evidence of all the four witnesses, and looking through the medical records, and the condition of deceased on my arrival, he had no doubt that deceased died from heart failure. The Coroner agreed with Doctor Anderson, finding that William Colson died from failure of the heart. The funeral took place at 4:30p.m. the following day. The site of the grave is currently unknown, but the place where he died is shown on the accompanying map. There is another V.F.A. footballer also buried in the Pioneer cemetery. This is Ken MacPherson who played with Richmond, Fitzroy, and Collingwood in the 1890's.


















ME PLAY ROSEBERY WOMEN'S HOCKEY
