## Railway collaboration picks up steam

The ALONGSIDE platform series kicked off in Queenstown last night with the first of four-weekend experiences. Friday's platform-based event at Queenstown Station featured Matthew Evans and Sadie Chrestman, of Fat Pig Farm fame. It was attended by more than 50 hungry ticket holders at a time of year traditionally very quiet for the award-winning region.

The experiential series is a collaboration between West Coast Wilderness Railway and the Linda Café and was

designed to drive visitation following the temporary pause on passenger trains throughout the winter period. It coincides with the State Government travel subsidy, named 'Head West, Out Shout', launched earlier this week.

"The Head West campaign means that visitors can experience the West Coast region for a fraction of what it might normally cost," says Jo-Ann Kerr, Chair of the local tourism association, Destination West Coast.

"Thanks to the Tasmanian Govern-

ment, visitors can attend one of several weekend experiences in either Queenstown or Strahan after a day of exploring, and stay in one of the properties participating in the campaign, so it's a win-win for everyone." says Ms Kerr.



## West Coast Beardos! Get Ready to Celebrate World Beard Day




The SES, TasNetworks and emergency crews were kept busy for a few days helping clean up the damage.

## Skate on thin ice in Macquarie Harbour

One of the country's leading think tanks, the Australia Institute, visited Strahan and Queenstown last week, meeting with community members to discuss issues with Macquarie Harbour and the plight of the endangered Maugean skate. Two researchers from the Tasmanian branch of the Institute were joined by the Marine Campaigner from Environment Tasmania, a Tasmanian conservation organisation.

Four themes emerged from the community consultation: the need for science to inform communities as well as drive decision-making, inadequate government consultation and action to date, the importance of local employment opportunities, and concern about the skate.

Recent Australia Institute research has found 76% of Tasmanians are concerned about the health of coastal waters. Despite most people (59%) being unaware just how bad the situation is for some of Tasmania's most popular fish species, one in two Tasmanians surveyed (49.8%) were not confident that the State government's current law reforms will do enough to protect the health of Tasmania's coastal waters.

In May 2023, Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies (IMAS) scientists interrupted a Maugean skate monitoring program in Macquarie Harbour to call for urgent conservation action, after finding the population of skate has rapidly declined by almost half since 2014.

Of particular concern is that they found very few juveniles coming through to keep the population viable.

"The federal environment minister Tanya Plibersek has acknowledged the key threat to the skate is low oxygen levels, the link with this to fish farming and the role of river flow management for hydro production," said Eloise Carr, Director of the Australia Institute Tasmania.

"The Maugean skate is like a canary in the coal mine – thanks to dedicated scientists we know it's in trouble, but we know far less about low oxygen impacts on other marine life. The skate is telling us that World Heritage Macquarie Harbour is in big trouble and that we need to take action to restore its health so that west coast communities that rely on the Harbour can also thrive," Ms Carr said.

Understandably, a key concern for the Strahan community is employment opportunities and what alternatives are available to open sea cages, such as land based aquaculture. Concerns were raised about potential impacts on jobs, and flow-on effects to community wellbeing if open-caged fish farming stopped.

Locals are taking their own action in standing up for the skate. Strahan-based Wildcare group, Friends of the Henty hope to continue bringing attention to the plight of the Maugean skate by raising funds to commission local artists to create works for permanent public display in Strahan.

This effort follows a highly successful community awareness project carried out by Cradle Coast NRM in early 2023, which saw over 70 pieces of skate-focused art displayed in businesses and public places throughout Strahan.

"We were in Strahan at the same time crisis talks were being held in Hobart and there was a sentiment expressed by locals that they felt let down by government, asking why it has to get to crisis point before action gets taken?" said Rebecca Howarth, Marine Campaigner for Environment Tasmania.

Dr Leonardo Guida, a shark scientist at the Australian Marine Conservation Society (AMCS), was at the Hobart workshop trying to find solutions to the extinction threat, with representatives from all levels of government, the salmon industry, Hydro Tasmania, researchers and the west coast community.

Dr Guida said the situation for the Maugean skate was "as dire as it gets" and called for the "immediate cessation" of fish farming in Macquarie Harbour, as well as changes to dam releases for producing hydroelectricity, which have a downstream effect on the harbour.

### New small grant funding for community health and wellbeing initiatives

Community groups are being invited to apply for funding to support community initiatives that improve the health and wellbeing of Tasmanians.

The latest round of the Tasmanian Liberal Government's Healthy Tasmania Step Forward Grants 2023-24 is now open and community groups can apply for funding for up to \$5,000 to go towards activities and equipment that help Tasmanians lead healthy and active lives.

Premier and Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing, Jeremy Rockliff, said the grants were an important part of the Tasmanian Liberal Government's strategy to improve the health and wellbeing of all Tasmanians, and to reduce the burden on the health system in the long term as a result of chronic conditions.

"This small grant scheme means more community organisations can purchase equipment and conduct activities that promote physical activity, healthy and sustainable eating as well as positive mental health and community engagement," the Premier said.

"Last year's grant recipients included West Coast MTB Club Tasmania who received \$3,640 to deliver a 3-day mountain biking development program, as well as \$4,990 for the West Coast Paddle Club to build capacity and grow

their participation rates.

"These are great examples of how the grant program brings together communities, services and different levels of government to work hand in hand in the best interests of the community.

"I encourage community sector organisations, community groups and local government to apply for a grant if they see an opportunity to improve the health and wellbeing of Tasmanians."

Applications will close once the funding pool of \$100,000 is allocated.

The Step Forward Grants are one of four grant streams in the Healthy Tasmania Fund, which the Tasmanian Liberal Government has committed

\$8 million to over three years as a key part of the Healthy Tasmania Five-Year Strategic Plan 2022-2026.

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### Strahan waterfront plans underway

The West Coast Council has taken a significant step towards rejuvenating the state. The design process will take into Strahan waterfront, as they have enlisted account community input and considthe services of design firm GHD Design to lead a project aimed at enhancing the

The project is set to be completed by June 2025 and is centered around creating a more appealing outdoor public space along the water's edge, with the goal of improving accessibility to waterfront businesses.

West Coast Mayor Shane Pitt has expressed his enthusiasm for the project, highlighting the positive impact it will have on Strahan and the broader West Coast community. The revitalisation plan is expected to not only facilitate better access to Strahan's port-related businesses but also provide an enriched and distinctive area for locals to gather and enjoy the scenic beauty of the waterfront.

Funding for the project comes from both federal and state sources, with a \$2 million grant from the federal government and nearly \$1.4 million from the eration of Strahan's historical heritage. In addition to the waterfront improvements, the West Coast Visitor Information Centre building is also slated for renovation to enhance its ability to serve tourists.

The roots of this revitalisation effort trace back to 2015 when the concept was initially proposed. The relocation of Tassal and Huon Aquaculture's fish farm operations to Smiths Cove prompted a reevaluation of Strahan's waterfront potential. The overarching goal of the plan is to create a sustainable vision for the area that harmonises economic, social, and environmental interests while maintaining a safe separation between working port activities and tourism-related endeavors. Construction is projected to begin prior to March of the upcoming year, with completion anticipated by June 2025.

## Mt Jukes area on the radar for mining exploration

The West Coast region's abundant mineral resources have recently garnered attention, sparking renewed interest in land located south of Queenstown.

Mineral Resources Tasmania, a state authority responsible for managing mineral-related activities, has outlined its intention to recommend that Resources Minister Felix Ellis approve a mineral exploration license encompassing an area of 170 square kilometers in the Mount Jukes region.

This license would be granted to Georgina Resources, a company based in Zeehan.

The proposed license would enable Georgina Resources to conduct exploration activities in search of various types of minerals, including metallic minerals, atomic substances, industrial minerals, as well as semi-precious and precious stones within the designated area.

Historically, the Mount Jukes area has been host to several small mines, with

much of the activity occurring during the early 20th century. These mines primarily focused on the extraction of copper and gold. The renewed interest in the region's mineral potential suggests that advancements in exploration technology and a growing demand for various minerals have prompted exploration efforts in the area.

If the mineral exploration license is granted, it could lead to further exploration and potential mining activities in the Mount Jukes area. Such activities could contribute to economic development in the region, create job opportunities, and potentially add to the overall mineral production of the West Coast.

It's important to note that mineral exploration and mining activities often involve careful consideration of environmental, social, and regulatory factors to ensure responsible and sustainable resource development.

### \$1.3 million for emergency food distribution to support Tasmanians

## Things are picking up at Avebury mine

The Rockliff Liberal Government is proudly pro-mining and recognises the important role that the Avebury mine plays for the West Coast community.

## Veterans post Robert 'Bob' Cartledge - Part two By Linton 'Harry" Harris

As covered in last month's article, Bob Cartledge at the tender age of 19 found himself, a Sergeant Medic in the world's first 'Television War'.

The conflict in Vietnam had become a most accessible war because of an in-

vention - "the television" that had finally filtered into Australian households. People, safely at home were updated nightly on news of the Vietnam War

As alluded to in the previous article, the newly promoted Sgt Bob Cartledge, crossed paths with two

recent subjects of the Veterans Post.

On the plane headed to Singapore en route to Vietnam, Bob spoke of a boisterous bravado, as soldiers oft do, masking their fears with trash talk. That being said, all of that changed once the plane left Singapore, next stop Vietnam, with chatter gradually reducing to a deathly silence, the closer the plane got.

On arrival, on the tarmac the view waiting for the inexperienced soldiers was a multitude of black pyjamas and pointy straw hats -the exact description of the enemy that had been drilled into them, during pre-deployment training.

These people of course, were simply South Vietnamese locals, with food, drink, and souvenirs for the new arrivals. But with all their weapons in the cargo hold of the plane, no one was getting out!

As a Sgt Medic, Bob was placed into a pool of similarly qualified soldiers which meant that he could be in a 'dust-off' chopper one day, and an orderly at the field hospital the next; this often included dealing with duties at the morgue.

In last month's article, we highlighted

service from Sapper Peter Lawrence Penneyston - a local lad KIA in August 1970.

Sapper Penneyston, triggered an explosive booby trap in one of the enemy tunnel systems in Vietnam.

As an attendant in the morgue, Bob, who had only been in country two short months was the attendant on duty when Sapper Penneyston was brought in. Bob talks of the grim job of dealing with the Australian KIA, doing his best to offer dignity to the fallen for their return home.

After hours, Sergeant Bob was often

found in the boozer at the Vung Tau Sergeants Mess, rinsing away the horrors of the day to day.

Another interesting coincidence is that he would've passed time with another previous subject of the Veterans Post, my dad, L/Cpl Lloyd Harris, who was the barman at the Sergeants Mess at around the same time!

Interestingly, and somewhat understandably 19-year-old Bob struggled in this environment, being significantly younger than the average sergeant; rules being that senior NCO's, weren't to mix with the regular and conscripted soldiers in his age group, he also struggled to relate to his peers at the rank of sergeant as he was a much younger, less experienced man.

The key thing that Bob took away from his experiences was the application of un-tried or unorthodox methods - operating in the 'grey' areas.

Much the same as the famed voodoo medics of the recent conflict in Afghanistan, he did what was required to save soldiers' lives, or at least tried; it was often very clear that the damaged state of the wounded, meant they were most likely going to succumb to their wounds. Bob couldn't have known it at the time, but these experiences, shaped the rest of his working life in the health field, both in Australia and overseas.

Being lowered into the jungle, dangling from a helicopter on dust-off missions, Bob preferred working with the yanks. The US pilots, with bravado (while from the outside appearing to be reckless) were anything but; they regularly risked both man and machine to support men just like Bob, who's primary duty was to do the impossible; dealing with the wounded in the midst and confusion of an active battlefield.

The Australian helicopter pilots were often enough hamstrung by a more risk-adverse hierarchy, consequently they simply didn't have the experience that their American brethren had.

The stories go on and on, and in all honesty, I think Bob could write a book of his exploits, next month's conclusion goes on to finish the story as to how Bob came to be on the West Coast in retirement





E GROW August Wild West - Wild Gardens by Potty about plants!

The recent storms are a stark reminder that choosing the right trees for our gardens is very important. The wild winds experienced throughout the West Coast resulted in many trees down and damage to houses, fences and other property.

Eucalyptus trees, while majestic, pose a real threat to the safety of people and property. At times trees and other plants can cause disputes between neighbours- relating to either plants that overhang, cause a nuisance, or overshadow property; or plants that interfere substantially with the use and enjoyment of your property. When we have wild weather as we have just experienced knowing who is responsible for the clean up of damaged or uprooted trees on or near your property is important.

Tasmania has the Neighbourhood Disputes about Plants Act 2017 which is designed to help Tasmanians resolve common neighbourhood disputes. A handy guide regarding this can be found on the Tasmania Legal Aide website: Fact sheet – Neighbourhood trees and plants (legalaid.tas.gov.au). While it is hoped that disputes over trees and plants won't occur between neighbour; sometimes it's unavoidable. Careful planting and growing in your garden will go a long way towards avoiding damage from felled or uprooted trees.

The wet winter that we are expe-

riencing on the West Coast can also dampen the spirits of even the most avid gardener. Getting out in the garden can be challenging; however, we are still experiencing a few beautiful winter mornings which provide a wonderful window of opportunity for growing and sowing. Using the Peter Cundall's diary of growing the following gardening can be undertaken.

PLANT: Certified seed potatoes, Jerusalem artichokes, shallots, and garlic cloves. It is also time for divisions of chives, rhubarb, and asparagus crowns; and young seedlings of cabbage, cauliflower, celery, broccoli, lettuce, onion and one of my favourite's leeks.

SOW: Direct where they are to be grown seed of peas (including snow peas). Sow directly in the ground broad beans, turnips, swedes, Asian brassicas, English spinach, and onions. In warm, well-drained soil or containers it is time to sow silverbeet, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, and lettuce seeds.

In the deep dark depths of the Rosebery Mine (actually 1.4km), our intrepid miners recently came across a large crystal of Witherite.

Witherite is a mineral consisting of the element Barium (BaCO3). It is relatively soft, and heavy. It is translucent yellow, and it fluoresces blue under ultra-violet light, which means it glows!

The size of the crystal (more than 2 metres) suggests it has been sitting and growing in a large hole (called a vugh) in the ground for a very long time.

Witherite was used as a rat poison back in the 18th Century, however, today it is used in steel making, adding to cement and in the process of glazing of porcelain. Its value depends on the purity, clarity, crystal shapes and size.

For MMG Rosebery, this is an interesting find, but not a commercial one.





Grace was awarded the \$5000 commission in 2022 and her completed artwork was unveiled at Soggy Brolly Gallery on Monday 24 July 2023.


