3. After stabilising the patient they then proceeded to the Burnie hospital but not before stopping 3 times to revive the patient.

If the A&E were operational then a nurse could have gone in the ambulance to stabilise the patient.

4. I believe that the infrastructure is still there it only needs suitable staffing.

Steamship building sold

West Coast Council would like to announce the sale of the Union Steamship Building Strahan, to 7469 Holdings Pty Ltd (Timbersea).

The building holds an important place in Strahan's history and is a beautiful structure in a perfect location. However, it is in poor condition with both cosmetic and structural issues which require a significant amount of work and resources to bring the building back to a structurally sound and usable condition. With current budget allocations Council cannot afford to undertake these works.

The sale includes structural rectification of the building and development of the middle floor as a leased community

space (museum/tourism related initiative). Refurbishment of the top level will be undertaken for visitor/long-term accommodation and the shopfronts will remain as retail frontage. The new owners have a demonstrated commitment to the West Coast, experience with heritage buildings and are excited to commence the restoration project.

The sale of building has been a very considered decision, with Council pleased that the final sale outcome will provide long-term benefits to Strahan and most importantly, will ensure the enhancement and preservation of this important historical building for generations to come.

West Coast oval upgrades

The renowned Queenstown gravel football oval is set to undergo a significant redevelopment and transformation under the plans of the West Coast Council.

During its February session, the council greenlit designs for the future enhancement of both the Queenstown and Rosebery ovals, contingent upon potential government funding.

To spearhead this endeavor, the council enlisted the expertise of consulting and design firm STRI Australia. Their task involves revamping the ovals to enhance drainage and irrigation systems, while also installing lighting that meets Australian Standards.

According to estimates provided by STRI, the total construction costs for this project are projected to reach around \$3.2 million, with approximately \$1.8 million allocated for the Rosebery Oval and \$1.4 million earmarked for Queenstown.

A staff report presented to councillors highlighted the pressing issues plaguing both ovals, including poor drainage and inadequate lighting. It noted that the Rosebery Oval, in particular, suffers from irrigation infrastructure failures during the peak summer season, hampering maintenance efforts.

The report also underscored the significant manpower devoted to maintaining these facilities during winter, draining internal resources.

Furthermore, the council resolved during the meeting to commission designs aimed at enhancing the surroundings of both ovals.

Notably, the Queenstown Oval boasts a rich history, dating back to 1895. Its cultural significance was recognised when it was inducted into the Tasmanian Football Hall of Fame in 2007.

Science leading the way in Macquarie Harbour



Teams of scientists, operational crews and marine specialists are encouraged as the Macquarie Harbour Oxygenation Project goes from strength to strength following the successful start to stage 1 trials.

Following a successful fit out, the research team and salmon companies have moored the oxygenation barge in place. In initial trials the barge has been drawing water from the sea at depth. Highly concentrated micro and nano bubbles of oxygen are then injected into that water, before releasing it back into the deeper water sections of the Harbour, elevating dissolved oxygen levels through passive diffusion and natural mixing.

Dr Jeff Ross, Associate Professor, at the Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies (IMAS) said "installation of the scientific monitoring and sensor operations over the past two weeks have been very productive. We have a live sensor array and live deck and underwater cameras operating and despite some initial teething issues with pump operations, which we have now overcome, the oxygenation looked good on camera with no evidence of too much vertical movement of the plume or bubbles.

"The provisional plan where we pumped 500kg/day for 3 days has gone very well. We will now increase this to 720kg/day over the weekend, take a breather before the next trial so we can process and digest the environmental and performance data and we then expect to progressively increase both the oxygen dosage and duration over the coming trials", said Dr Ross.

Salmon Tasmania CEO, Luke Martin, said "We are the one industry that is showing leadership in responding to the threats to the skate amongst a myriad of inputs into the harbour and

we are proud of the teams of scientists and operational crews who are leading the charge.

"The project will cost upward of \$7 million over the next two-years and represented the industry's major contribution to the Maugean Skate Conservation Recovery Plan. We stand up for a responsible and science led aquaculture industry that is so critical to Tasmania's economy and hundreds of Tasmanian families said Mr Martin.

"Our objective is to test whether the MHOP could form part of a long-term strategy to improve the Macquarie Harbour environment for the skate, while responding to the challenge of warming waters and other climatic factors.

"At a minimum, we aim to offset the total oxygen drawdown of our own salmon aquaculture activities in the Harbour, and further reduce the impact of our operations on the environment."

"Whilst initial trials will use diesel to run the equipment, 100% of diesel used will be offset through carbon initiatives and once proven, we will be seeking a long-term renewable energy source.

"With farmed salmon being one of the world's most carbon friendly proteins, the importance of the success of our industry should not be understated," said Mr Martin.

ABOUT OUR EPBC SUBMISSION

Salmon Tasmania has publicly released its submission to the Federal Government's review of a 2012 decision on salmon farming in Macquarie Harbour.

The Submission details clearly that there is no scientific evidence that demonstrates removing aquaculture from Macquarie Harbour will ensure the future of the Maugean skate in its endemic habitat, and there is absolutely no legal justification for the Australian Government to reverse its 2012 decision on salmon farming in the harbour.

The submission also includes new scientific analysis demonstrating the minimal impact of aquaculture on oxygen levels in the natural environment for the Skate.



PressWEST workshop held on February weekend

PressWEST, the Queenstown Art Centre held its first workshop for 2024 on the weekend of 23/25 February. Titled 'Ecotone- West Coast Transformational zones' the workshop unfolded across five sessions with the emphasis on the art techniques of painting and collage. A Friday evening launch and exhibition was attended by 50 plus including West Coast Council's Deputy Mayor Robert Butterfield.

Tutors for the workshop included 2023 Glover prize winning artist Jo Chew with support from painters Amber Koroluk-Stephenson, Anne Morrison and George Kennedy. The participants were local and intrastate artists coming together to create new work in response to the 'Ecotone' title.

Ecotone is a term coined in the 19th Century by the naturalist Alfred Wallace to describe the 'zone' where two biological communities meet and integrate. The 'tussle' between rainfor-



est and eucalyptus species in the mountains and valleys of the West Coast is an example of this concept. The workshop developed this concept as a metaphor for both micro and macro aspects of the West Coast environment.

Local business provided great support. Joy from the Paragon cooked several great meals, Neil drove the RoamWild bus to take us on a field trip to Zara's Linda Hotel Cafe and Emma and Mark from Moonscape Cafe were their immaculate hospitable selves. 

Liberal's strong plan to revitalise the West Coast

A majority Liberal Government has a plan to revitalise the West Coast, with the single largest suite of measures for the West Coast in a generation.

"The West Coast has been through the wringer, with Labor threatening to shut Macquarie Harbour aquaculture, and 200 jobs lost at Avebury Mine," Premier Jeremy Rockliff said.

"We want to end this uncertainty, and restore confidence to the West Coast so it can continue to thrive for generations to come.

"As part of our 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future, we will back in the West with the single largest suite of measures in a generation.

"We will back its competitive strengths from aquaculture to mining to forestry.

"My first commitment is that Macquarie Harbour will not shut on our watch, we will also unlock native forests to support sawmillers and invest in new mining opportunities, including standing up for Mt Lyell.

"We will invest \$5 million into the recently announced Western Tasmania Strategic Regional Partnership, that will shape our investment for the next decade.

"This includes \$3 million for Key Worker Accommodation and \$2 million for a new Rosebery Emergency Services Hub. "Key roads and safety upgrades will also be a priority of our Revitalise the Region investments.

"We will provide \$10 million for improvements to the Murchison and Zeehan Highways, \$10 million towards the Ridgley Highway, and \$19 million to improve the Lyell Highway.

"Having reliable health services is critical to our regions. We will upgrade telehealth at the West Coast District Hospital, recruit two new community paramedics, and extend our partnership with the Royal Flying Doctor service to fund the regional dental services.

"We will work with the West Coast Council on its plan to adapt the Rosebery Health Care Centre to deliver outreach health services and the Federal Labor Government for more aged care beds on the West Coast.

"Tourism will be championed too, with an additional \$600,000 for the Zeehan Heritage Centre, over three years to 2028, to continue to manage and maintain its unique collection of mining heritage that helped build Tasmania.

"My Government is committed to ensuring that the West Coast gets as much as it gives to our State, and that's what this Revitalising our Regions package will deliver."

Labor's plan to boost our regional teacher workforce

A Rebecca White Labor Government will act to improve educational outcomes with a plan for the recruitment and retention of high-quality teaching staff in regional government schools.

Josh Willie, Shadow Minister for Education said "Labor's plan will broaden incentive payments from eight isolated, rural and regional schools to a total of 40, and increase the amounts of incentive annual payments currently paid to rural and regional teachers.

A Labor Government will also provide regional housing incentives, with stamp duty waivers on buying a home in a regional area, in return for a regional teaching commitment, as well as providing more rental accommodation dedicated to key workers, including teachers.

With a teacher shortage impacting every state, the Federal Government's National Teacher Workforce Action Plan is expected to lift the number of graduates to meet demand, but there is still a need for experienced educators, particularly in regional and hard-to-staff locations.

Braddon Labor candidate, Danielle Kidd, who has worked across the region supporting people to access employment, education and training opportunities, said teachers were often left distressed because of their limited time to offer students information and experiences to help them make decisions about their future.

"Our teachers do an amazing job but right now they have a lot on their plate," Ms Kidd said.

"This initiative will enable teachers to become ingrained within the community they are working and allow them to take time and ensure students are equipped with valuable skills to make them job-ready."

A Teepookana train treat

Who am I to argue when I get invited to take a trip on the newly opened West Coast Wilderness Railways trip out to Teepookana?

Smoked salmon, pumpkin scones, wine, great company and a day 'clickclacking' along the rails to this historic township area make for a great day out.

The journey is a 2.5 hour experience that stops at Lower Landing Station on the banks of the King River for approximately 45-60 minutes.

The commentary has been redeveloped to tell the story of the once thriving port of Teepookana and how life would have looked for those that lived out along the line

At Lower Landing Station passengers can read more about life at Teepookana and Camp Spur or head down to the riverbank to chat with WCWR guides about the local flora

Teepookana and the King journeys are led by heritage Drewry locomotives and depart five days a week throughout the shoulder and peak seasons and three days a week throughout low season (journeys depart Queenstown on the 'off days', ensuring up to six departures a week across the business throughout low season).

WCWR has launched the timetable for the remainder of 2024 and intends to run Teepookana and the King through until April 2025.

WCWR is currently in discussions with the Tasmanian State Government regarding funding of work needed to reopen the more remote sections of the line.

Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

MAN'S BODY FOUND AT ZEEHAN RACECOURSE. DEATH BY HIS OWN HAND

Mr. Everard Vaughan Goldsmid held many responsible positions at Zeehan, including Registrar of the Court of Requests; Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages; Commissioner of the Supreme Court; Coroner; Registrar of the Court of Mines; Clerk of Petty Sessions; Chairman of the Zeehan Fire Brigade; Justice of the Peace and Secretary of the local Masonic Lodge.

On Thursday, February 26, 1914, aged



57, he took his own life.

The deceased was born in Edinburgh in 1857, into a well-to-do military family and was educated at Harrow and Sandhurst. He served with the British Army in India where he suffered sunstroke, which caused him to leave the army, and eventually he came to Australia. He was married with two sons and had lived on the West Coast since 1890.

A coronial enquiry was held the next afternoon.

The first witness called was Sergeant Patrick Francis Lonergan, who deposed that he last spoke to the deceased in his office in the Courthouse buildings on Thursday morning about 9:30am. The deceased appeared to be in his usual state of health. At about 10:00am he saw the deceased again when he was coming away from the Post Office and going in the direction of the Council Chambers. That was the last time the witness saw

him alive.

The witness returned to his office at about 2:25pm where he found a letter on his writing pad. The letter read as follows: "Zeehan, February 26, 1914.

Sergeant Lonergan, Zeehan. 'Sir, You will find me in the grandstand at the racecourse. You had better send a couple of men out, as in all probability they will have to bring my

corpse in. Please deliver the letters found in my pockets, and break the news as gently as you can to my wife. Yours faithfully, E.V. GOLDSMID."

After reading this he rang Dr. Best, Mr A.J. Douglas

(a solicitor), and Mr Clements (a Carter), and together they went to the racecourse, arriving there at about 3:30pm. They found the body of the deceased in a room underneath the grandstand. He appeared to have died without any struggle. On the left side within arm's length, there was a bottle and

a glass. The glass contained a small amount of liquid, and the bottle also contained a small quantity of liquid. The bottle was labelled "Solution of Potassium Cyanide, 10. A.P. Miller and Son, Pharmaceutical Chemists, Zeehan."

In the presence of Dr. Best, Mr Douglas, and Constable Lawther, the witness searched the deceased's body where he found the following property: Two gold rings on left little finger, an empty whisky flask, two pipes in cases, box of matches, and tobacco pouch, memorandum book and pencil, notice meeting Fire Brigade Board, Zeehan, a watch with a gold double chain with an empty sovereign purse attached, pencil, 9s 3d. in silver and 3d. in copper, two keys, penknife, silver matchbox, three Yale keys, one fountain pen, one card case containing visiting card, and a note about some public moneys received, pair of scissors, two pairs spectacles in cases, "The Zeehan

and Dundas Herald" of February 26, 1914, four office keys on chain, one silk handkerchief, one letter addressed to Mrs Goldsmid, one addressed to J.S. Munro, and two to A.J. Douglas. On a window

sill he found a writing pad and envelope.

Alban Best, medical practitioner, deposed that on arrival at the racecourse he saw the body of the deceased. There were no marks of violence and he felt the deceased had not been dead for more than a few hours. From the amount of poison the bottle would have contained he believed that death would have taken place in a matter of minutes. There were indications consistent with cyanide poisoning.

Hedley Todd, chemist, deposed that on January 31 he had sold Mr Goldsmid one ounce of 10 per cent. cyanide potassium solution. Deceased said he wanted the solution to remove stains caused by marking ink. He thought ingesting 30 minims (about two millilitres) of the solution would cause death.

Hector Vistarini, barman at the Caledonian Hotel, deposed he last saw deceased alive between 9:00 and 9:30 on the morning of the 26th when he supplied him with a shilling's worth of whisky in a flask. Deceased appeared to be the same as usual.

Frederick Batt, a Tasmanian Government audit inspector, deposed he last saw deceased alive about 10:30 a.m. on February 26 at his office in the Courthouse. Deceased appeared

to be in good health and in his normal condition.

George Steadman, Council foreman, stated he saw deceased at about 10:30am on the day of his death on the King

Extended Hill. As he passed witness he said "Good morning, Steadman," and appeared to be as usual. Deceased was carrying a book or a writing pad. He was going in the direction of Wilson Street, which led towards the racecourse.

William Wade, Tasmanian Government Railway Department porter, deposed he saw deceased pass Raynah Junction on the line between Zeehan and Dundas between 11:00 and 11:30. Saw him turn off the line and go in the direction of the racecourse.

The evidence all pointed to the suicide of Mr Goldsmid and the Coroner agreed. The funeral took place on the following Sunday afternoon.

Indeed, an extremely mysterious, sudden and sad demise of a very well respected citizen of early Zeehan.

A HEROIC REMEDY.

ZEEHAN, Friday.

A middle aged woman named Smith, living at Trial Harbour, was bitten by a snake to-day on the finger while at a creek washing. The snake clung to the finger, but Mrs. Smith knocked it off with a stick, and, hastening to the house close by, requested her father to chop the finger off, which he did with a tomahlwk. She then started to ride to Zeehan on hibrseback, a distance of 12 miles, and attended at the hospital. At the present time (2.45) she is very sleepy, and has to be kept walking about, but fatal consequences are not feared, as directly the bite occurred she tied a string tightly round the finger and wrist. When she arrived at Zeehan she was very weak from loss of blood.

After Snake Had Bitten

By promptly shooting off the top of his finger, Howard Bennett, of Zeehan, probably saved his life when bitten by a snake.

When Benn tt. working at Powell's siding, on the Strahan line, entered his bunk after two days' absence at home over the week-end, he noticed a rat in a trap set under his bunk. He reached down, and was bitten on the thir: finger of his right hand by a snake.



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



A message from the Tasmania Fire Service

We are still well and truly in bushfire season, and although it may feel like we're at the tail end, the risk of fire is still very real. That in mind, it's important to take the time to do the thinking now, meaning should a bushfire strike, we can simply just act. That means it's critical that you understand your individual risk for bushfire, discuss and put together a bushfire plan with your household, and also prepare your property as best you can. But also, let's not forget to effectively prepare an emergency kit.

So, what is an emergency kit?

An emergency kit is a collection of essential items that will help you survive a bushfire or emergency incident. This kit should be resourced to support you for up to 2-3 days. Your kit should be prepared now, and stored somewhere that is easily accessible, allowing you to quickly grab and go. This will save you vital time during an emergency, allowing you to act on other items in your bushfire plan.

What's the difference between an emergency kit, and other essential items you need to grab in an emergency?

An emergency kit is something you can 'set and forget' until you need it in an emergency. This means that items included do not need maintenance or replacing within 12 months of packing. These are things such as a battery-operated radio, torch, spare batteries, water, non-perishable food items, first aid kit, etc. Other essential items are things you typically use in your day to day life, and can't be stored away. To account for these, it is important to write a list that can be included in your emergency kit. That way, when you grab your emergency kit, you will have this to immediately refer to, ensuring you can grab items such as important

documents, wallet, phone, charger, medications, toiletries, pet items and more.

Leave early to ensure you can pack more!

It's always best to leave early before a bushfire emergency. Ensuring you keep up to date with Australian Fire Danger Rating System, and alerts and warnings via TasAlert, not only will you get to safety quicker and easier, but it means you will be able to pack more items. Remember, you may be away from home for 2-3 days, so allow yourself time to pack your creature comforts! This might be additional clothes, food items, or even your favourite stuffed toy to help you get through.
