Rockcliff on track on the west coast

The Tasmanian Liberal Government today signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the West Coast Council and key industry leaders.

Premier Jeremy Rockliff said the MoU was an important next step in progressing the Government's commitment to develop a Strategic Regional Partnership with the Western Region of Tasmania.

"We know by working together, by sharing ideas, by collaborating and most importantly by involving and listening to our community we can help grown and support our communities to be thriving, welcoming place to live and visit," the Premier said.

"This MoU cements our goodwill to work collaboratively toward a Strategic Regional Partnership to achieve those ends.

"Our Government has a vision for Tasmania's regions that ensures they have the infrastructure, services and people they need to thrive and attract investment for sustained growth and prosperity.

"The Memorandum of Understanding outlines how our Government will continue to work with the Council, RDA-Tasmania and industry to formalise our partnership."

The MOU outlines our commitment to:


Improve accommodation, infrastructure, and amenity of towns to attract and retain workers and families;

What does the future hold for Mt Lyell mine?


It seems that there is significant anticipation surrounding the future of the Mount Lyell Mine in Queenstown, Australia. The mine has been inactive since a series of workplace fatalities in 2013 and 2014, but there have been ongoing efforts to improve the situation. Currently, South African-based mining company Sibanye-Stillwater is poised to make a decision about whether to acquire the mine from its current owner, Vedanta Resources. This decision is expected to be made before November 5, 2023.

Australian-based company New Century Resources had also shown interest in acquiring Mount Lyell, with plans to resume copper mining or extract minerals from existing tailings. However, Sibanye's successful takeover of New Century has added complexity to the situation. Sibanye is now in the final

stages of its assessment of Mount Lyell's feasibility.

The copper market's positive outlook and strong supply-demand dynamics, along with the ongoing feasibility study on Mount Lyell, have left industry leaders like Ray Mostogl, the CEO of the Tasmanian Minerals, Manufacturing and Energy Council, hopeful about the mine's future. It's suggested that Sibanye's interest in copper and the positive findings from the Mount Lyell study are indicative of a potential revival for the mine.

As of now, there is a significant level of interest and activity surrounding the Mount Lyell Mine's potential acquisition and reopening, and industry experts are cautiously optimistic about the positive signs that have been emerging.

Cutting edge council verging on decision

The West Coast Council is considering ending its unique practice of maintaining nature strips outside dwellings and is seeking public feedback on a draft policy that would shift the responsibility of nature strip maintenance to residents.

Unlike most Tasmanian councils, where residents are expected to look after nature strips themselves, the West Coast Council has been maintaining them at an estimated cost of over \$200,000 per year. This practice originates from the historical context of mining towns, where mining companies used to own and maintain various aspects of the towns, including nature strips and house maintenance.

The proposed draft nature strips policy outlines several key points:

Responsibility Shift: Under the new policy, residents would be responsible for maintaining and mowing any lawns or vegetation on the nature strips adjacent to their properties.

Safety Considerations: Residents would need to ensure that any vegetation on the nature strips doesn't obstruct the line of sight for drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists.

Height Restrictions: Vegetation, except for street trees managed by the council, should not exceed a height of 90 centimeters.

Assistance for Inability: Residents who are unable to maintain their nature strips to

an acceptable standard can apply to the council for help.


Nature Strip Gardens: The draft policy would allow for nature strip gardens, subject to specific conditions.

Prohibited Items: Certain items would be banned from nature strips, unless the council issues a permit. These include sculptures, fencing, synthetic turf, declared weeds, prickly or poisonous plants, plants that commonly cause allergies, and irrigation systems.

Native Species: The draft policy provides a list of native plant species that residents could consider planting on their nature strips.

Notably, root vegetables would be prohibited from being grown on nature strips, likely due to potential issues with obstruction and damage to underground infrastructure.

The West Coast Council's consideration of this policy change reflects a move toward aligning with the practices of other local government areas, where residents typically maintain their own nature strips. The decision would not only impact the council's budget but also promote community involvement and responsibility in maintaining their immediate surroundings.



Strong winds reveal another waterfall

The recent strong winds that we experienced have downed trees revealing another waterfall on the Granville Tramway.

This waterfall is situated at the terminus of the six mile creek where it joins with the Pine river.

The site consists of very steep terrain and is best viewed from the Zeehan side of the river . This will require a three kilometres return walk across the button grass ridges..

Attracting visitors from Devonport, Hobart and further south, the Wild Seafood ALONGSIDE event was the last of six events hosted across Regatta Point and Queenstown Stations throughout the month of August, during the railway's winter maintenance period.

"Hosting six events in one month was a brave undertaking by the team and I'm proud of the way the team pulled together and not only successfully hosted the events, but made sure everyone had a wonderful night out" says Ian Robertson, General Manager for West Coast Wilderness Railway. "We thought the

concept, presented by Zara Trihey from Linda Café, was fabulous and we were keen to do what we could to partner with and support other local businesses. We were pleasantly surprised at how everyone supported the events and the team worked together to make each event a roaring success."

Other events included partnerships with Matthew Evans and Innes Distillery, as well as bringing performers such as Mamma Rosa and Urshula Leung into the region.

The first and last event stood alone, while the remaining events were hosted in Queenstown on Friday nights in August and Strahan on Saturday nights.

When asked if future events may be on the cards, Mr Robertson was reserved, "We certainly have much more confidence around hosting and planning events, but our core business is our absolute priority and we're very focused on re-opening a safe, reliable and memorable heritage rail experience for the



businesses that depend on us, as well as eager ticket holders".

"We know that winter has been tough around the entire state and, despite some strong results compared to other regions, the West has not been immune to the seasonal downturn. The best thing we can do now is to focus wholly and solely on reopening the railway, which is at a point where we can now engage our Commercial team and have them working on a reopening plan. Once this

is in place and we have met the required infrastructure project milestones, we can start talking about a phased reopening and dates."

Mr Robertson was recently appointed officially as General Manager, after acting in the role from January 2023.

Nicky and Yolande from Study Hub West Coast attended the Fearless Festival and then dinner and found it to be really empowering for young adults and mature women (see photo).


The vibe at the dinner was incredible and so powerful to hear stories from a range of diverse women.

"With assessment of the Rentails project also progressing, these new facilities could greatly improve the outlook of the feasibility study which is currently in the process of being updated.

"Should Rentails go ahead it would mean not only significant investment in the region but the creation of hundreds of new jobs new on the West Coast, initially for construction but also for the life of the project.

"With business having the confidence to invest, mines re-opening, mineral exploration booming and increasing global demand for minerals produced right here in Tasmania, the future for our mining sector is bright.

The four-day festival will include a broad range of artforms and artists reflecting the history and changing stories of the West Coast through their work. Festival highlights include live music, visual art, geology tours and immersive art experiences for audiences of all ages.

The Unconformity Art Trail features the work of more than 50 West Coast artists, including painters, sculptors, jewellers and photographers, hosted in venues throughout the streets of Queenstown. The Art Trail invites audiences into unique spaces to view and purchase the creative work of local artists.

Just outside of Queenstown, Linda Hotel will be the canvas for West Coast artist Annette van Betlehem's work, Neorama. From sunset each night of the festival, Annette's oil paintings will be projected onto the historic ruins of the hotel.

Audiences of all ages will enjoy Earthshine, a seven-metre moon which will illuminate the old limestone quarry in its celestial glow. Luke Jerram's Museum of the Moon will be accompanied by live musical performances, enveloping the quarry in phases of light and dark, reflection and transformation.



State-of-the-art technology enhancing safety at **Rosebery mine**

Rosebery is the first mine in Australia to introduce Hexagon's fatigue detection technology in its underground mine operations.

The camera technology sits on the vehicle's dashboard and will send alerts through audible sounds and seat vibration when it detects fatigue and distraction.

Rosebery mine worked with Hexagon to install the technology in 11 underground trucks with 81 operators now registered to use the system.

Rosebery Community Consultative **Committee meeting**

Design and Assessment Works for the South Marionoak Tailings Storage Facility (TSF) have been published on the EPBC Public Portal inviting comments. We await a decision from the Federal Government on next steps.

The Rosebery Heritage Centre and Replica Miner's Hut is expected to reopen for the community before Christmas after it was damaged by fire. MMG is working with builders to complete the repairs.

On conclusion of Bob's tour, he returned to Australia. Australia's involvement in that war, wrapped up a short while later, so a second tour of duty to Vietnam, was never really contemplated.

Bob had served for around four years at this time, and continued in service to Australia, for a comparatively uneventful 13yrs altogether.

On discharge from the army, continuing his chosen career path, he became an enrolled nurse. Despite his experience he found himself ill prepared for civilian nursing, in the mid 1980's.

Bob often found himself reverting back to the unorthodox methods on the battlefield; techniques learnt through desperate necessity, but were frowned upon in civilian nursing.

Having said that, he garnered begrudging respect from his peers when it worked.

Subsequently, doors opened for Bob, that meant a rich and diverse career path ahead. Moving between jobs within the Australian health system, he gathered skills and sometimes adapted them through techniques well beyond what should be expected of a nurse. This garnered him the respect of his peers, and eventually saw Bob move into the role

of Ward Master.

These diverse range of experiences, left Bob in good stead to be 'cherry-picked' by those who appreciated the skill and adaptability that came naturally to Bob. Bob found himself living the Expat life, as the director of nursing in

a major Saudi Arabian emergency hospital.

It's hard to imagine what it must be like to live in a secular country like Saudi Arabia, particularly given that it wasn't even close to as moderate as it is nowadays. The expat life in Saudi, to my understanding is often lived in compounds specifically made for westerners, however the nature of Bob's work, meant that he

had plenty of exposure to the local population.

Bob regales snippets of information being fed to him by trusted locals, such as, 'stay home this weekend'... seemingly innocuous statements that would turn out to be the key to staying safe, with localised banditry and terrorism oft occurring on these same weekends.

Bob talks of late night excursions to Medina, one of the most sacred cities in Islam, just to get some cigarettes, going places no westerner should, just to serve his vice!

The increased targeting of westerners saw the eventual end of Bob's life as an expat. With a reaction bordering on boredom and certainly complacency, a bomb rocked his home in the middle

of the night; it was a bit 'ho-hum' to Bob, but his wife was on the floor in a millisecond!

Old soldiers are rarely rattled when everyone thinks you should be; but to varying degrees harbour the ghosts of their past military life and keep these things locked away, until one day they are not; harbouring rage that is often bordering on homicidal, such is the way for

war-caused PTSD.

Back in Australia, Bob resumed his career, working in regional Victoria, but found himself in a toxic environment, not quite settling in. I

n this time period he put forward an expression of interest as the clinical manager of Queenstown hospital, taking up the position in 2008. During this time, Bob was key in making a number of rapid changes; some that weren't popular, but found their place within the

hospital, due to respect for Bob's lived experience.

Around the same time, Bob's inner demons were catching up with him and eventually led to him being sent on stress leave. Bob's manager made an undiagnosed statement, being, 'Bob came to us with PTSD', mitigating the Tasmanian health systems responsibility in the reasons for his stress. The consequence of this saw Bob being formally diagnosed with war caused PTSD and subsequently pensioned off, attaining the gold card at 60yrs of age.

To Bob's credit, he has now found his peace. Buddhism being the key; he still enjoys some of the things the purest followers of Buddhism would frown on - enjoying the odd steak, and a tipple. Nowadays, Bob also leads Tai Chi classes and as a graduate of the University of the 3rd Age, he stays busy with his passion for art, creating sculptures of many different shapes and themes. Not surprisingly, we see respect for veterans past and present, in his work. Thank you for your service Bob.
