A closer look at space



The West Coast Space Show recently completed its inaugural tour across Tasmania's West and Central Coast, visiting Strahan, Zeehan, Queenstown, Ulverstone, Devonport, and a school

in Burnie. Funded by the Australian Government through National Science Week, the event reached over 255 participants.

Our show featured a space-themed

presentation alongside interactive elements, including meteorite samples, impact glass (including the local West Coast 'Darwin glass'), and Lego models of the Saturn V rocket and Space Shut-

tle. Two telescopes - a Schmidt-Cassegrain and a new robotic Seestar S50 - were also part of the exhibit, though weather conditions limited their use.

Stormy start to Spring-damage everywhere

Tough times bring out the best in Tasmanians. That's especially true of our incredible emergency responders.

The storm and flood event we've just lived through was severe and destructive.

Trees down everywhere, people trapped in their homes, businesses flooded, power off for more than a week with sadly more challenges remaining.

But in that adversity, we are reminded why this is one of the best places in the world to live, work and raise a family.

We are a community that wraps our arms around each other in times of need. As Tasmanians, we activated an army of helpers from all walks of life.

SES volunteers from the North West, East Coast and down the Tasman converging on Launceston to relieve their mates fatigued after many hard days in the field.

Police officers and firefighters working alongside each other to doorknock and evacuate vulnerable people in flood zones.

TasNetworks crews have been working around the clock to get the lights back on, returning to find their own homes without power too.

Surf life savers trading the beach for flooded rivers as part of our specialist swift water rescue team.

Family, friends and community groups who opened their doors to others

needing a cuppa, a hot shower and a place to charge their phones.

And the businesses who said to their staff to take the week so they could volunteer, forgoing earnings for the greater good. To all these people and many more, we say thank you.

The Tasmanian community has been incredible. For the most part we have done our preparations, followed instructions from emergency services and stayed safe.

The TasAlert app even reached Number 1 in its category in the App Store, with well over 40,000 downloads.

As the floodwaters subside and the winds ease, we have now turned our mind to the recovery.

The Tasmanian Government has activated assistance packages to support people with the cost of recovery.

Payments are available for short and long periods without power, for homes rendered uninhabitable, and we have also waived the landfill levy for goods spoiled by the storm and flood.

And if more support is needed, we won't hesitate to act.

This has been, and will remain, a Team Tasmania effort.

A notable highlight of the tour was the exceptional knowledge demonstrated by the West Coast children about rocks! It was amazing to see how readily the young attendees applied this understanding to grasp the composition and structure of the meteorites on display.

Their ability to draw parallels between terrestrial and extraterrestrial rocks was incredibly impressive.

The event also sparked in-depth discussions. Attendees posed thought-provoking questions on diverse topics, from the practicalities of living in space to the broader philosophical implications of space exploration. There was particular interest in Australia's future involvement in space missions, including the Artemis program, which is working to establish a permanent moon base, and a human mission to Mars in the coming decade. Attendees were also fascinated and inspired to hear about Tasmania's deep connection with the history and practice of radio astronomy.

The depth and range of questions we received were remarkable, and it's clear that there's a genuine curiosity about space among West Coast residents of all ages. The West Coast Space Show is part of our longer-term larger initiative to eventually operate a 'West Coast Space Centre' in Strahan (see <westcoastspacecentre.com>). This centre will act as both a science education facility and a community learning space offering displays, documentaries, public talks, and community resources. While the physical centre remains very early in the planning stages, we intend to continue our outreach efforts in the meantime.

Future plans include potentially incorporating a portable planetarium dome into their tours, and developing a podcast documentary about space history in Tasmania. To that end, we're particularly keen to hear about any memories or existing artefacts from the CSIR observation of the solar eclipse, conducted from Ocean Beach in Strahan

in the late-1940s.


For space enthusiasts inspired by the show, several upcoming astronomical events may be visible from Tasmania, weather and other conditions permitting:

- September 17: Conjunction of the Moon and Saturn
- September 18: Full Moon, Partial lunar eclipse, Lunar occultation of Neptune
- September 21: Neptune at opposition
- September 24: Close approach of the Moon and Jupiter
- September 25: Moon at Last Quarter, Conjunction of the Moon and Mars

Visibility of these events will depend on local conditions, and some may require specialised equipment to observe, but many of these are likely to be visible with the naked eye, or a good pair of binoculars.

The West Coast Space Show and the proposed Space Centre project align with increasing focus on STEM education in regional areas. We hope these initiatives will contribute to existing scientific curiosity in the region; the passion, intelligence, and interest of the community in space and space science was clearly evident during National Science Week!

Arthur-Pieman Conservation Area access upgrades complete

Works to replace the Cassiterite Creek Bridge as well as repair and upgrade shack node roads in the Arthur-Pieman Conservation Area are complete.

Minister for Parks and Environment, Nick Duigan, said the bridge is now open and will provide ongoing secure access to the historic mining town of Balfour for residents and visitors to the area.

"The new bridge, which was cast in Ulverstone and installed by Hazell Bros, has a 100-year lifespan and its load capacity has increased to modern standards as a result of the works," Minister Duigan said.

"The replacement also allows continued access by Tasmania Parks and Wildlife Service staff so they can maintain this area, which holds natural and historical value.

"Additionally, upgrades to improve shack node roads in the Arthur-Pieman region are now complete, including vegetation clearing, new road culverts and re-gravelling, with new safety and advisory signage planned to be installed. These works supported the regional economy through the engagement of local contractors including sourcing materials from local quarries.

"The bridge replacement and road maintenance works represent a

\$900,000 investment from the \$10 million Tasmanian Government commitment to support sustainable recreational off-road vehicle opportunities in the Arthur-Pieman Conservation Area, and the wider West Coast region.

"An important part of our 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future is to continue to build on Tasmania's reputation as a world-leading tourism destination, highlight Tasmania's unique experiences, and ensure that the visitor economy continues to have a positive impact on Tasmania's environment, economy, and way of life.

"The Tasmanian Government acknowledges how special the Arthur-Pieman Conservation Area is, containing outstanding natural values and part of the Western Tasmania Aboriginal Cultural Landscape National Heritage Place. Ensuring access and maintenance of roads in the region is important to enabling safe and sustainable enjoyment of this area by Tasmanians and visitors."

Arthur-Pieman Conservation Management Committee Chair, Lochie Avery, welcomed the upgrades.

"As part of our role in representing the local community, we have worked closely with the Tasmania Parks and Wildife Service to support the delivery of improvements to shack node roads, providing safer access for the community to key areas of the APCA," Mr Avery said.

"It was great to see upgrades to a range of areas, including West Point, Bluff Hill, Airerys Roads, Nelson Bay, Sarah Anne and Couta Rocks."

PressWEST's 'Mass equals Pigment' Art Workshop

It's a story of prospecting, sifting, washing, digging, exploding & tunnelling the rocky, mineralised ground. The story of an 'expanding field' of glittering, shining, pigmented and precious



textures.

PressWEST's recent workshop (23-25 August) aimed to encourage all participants to engage with these concepts and reflect on them with specific materials. There are both qualities of beauty and concepts of the abject toxic possibly in this gritty 'expanded field'. There is a

sense of refinement in the forging, extruding and polishing of material. There

is also a giving up to chance, possibly the chaotic, in the kaleidoscopic rearrangement of the materials.

UTAS Field placement student with PressWEST Jane Addison commented on her experiences: 'A field trip to Mt Jukes mine and the inspiration of Tasmanian artists sparked learning, experimentation and enthralling art making on a winter weekend at the Mass Equals Pigment workshop at PressWEST.

With an invitation to experiment and iterate, a group of 18 participants worked with artists Penny Mason, David Marsden, Emma Magnusson Reid and Michael Muruste to produce a large collaborative piece combining individual inspirations, interpretations and experiments.





Together we carried a big sheet of paper to the Mt Jukes mine and ventured deep into the mountain, leaving the paper to the elements. Soaked with rain, ochres and inks, the paper became the basis for a collaborative work that evolved over the weekend. Drawing on the experiences, artefacts and stories of the landscape and its geological and human history, participants produced a beautiful and diverse collection of relief prints, watercolour paintings, Suminagashi, collages and drawings.

Great company, conversation, food and the generosity of those sharing their work, stories and enthusiasm to get on with making made it a fabulous weekend. More to come at the next workshop in October. The Mass Equals Pigment workshop was supported with an exhibition, attended by participants and members of the Queenstown community'.

We have 27 hand Weaver spinners and dyers groups around our state of Tasmania, predominantly wool is spun, but also alpaca, possum silk, cotton, mohair and flax, wallaby and baby camel. However, other fibres are now available, including some made from banana, seaweed, rose bush, bamboo, nettle, corn, wood, tinsel and hemp.

There are other fibres to which we have access, and some of the preceding is spun also with wool. Currently in far north Queensland, the fibres from coconuts are being spun. Here in Tasmania, Guild members are fortunate to have access to superfine Merino and other high-quality fleece.

World 'Spin in Public' day will be celebrated in parks and other venues around the state. We have been fortunate here in Zeehan to be able to set up our spinning wheels under cover outside the Western Echo office at 127 main street Zeehan, opposite the museum. In addition, we will have a portable, modern loom with us and our two-me-

ter high, freestanding replica of a stone

weighed ancient Jewish loom made by local spinner, Rob Pearn with unmilled local timber. This loom has no nails, screws or glue used in it construction and well worth viewing. We will be spinning from 10.15am, to 2:30pm on Saturday 14 September, subject to weather conditions, namely wind, and

we'll have an extra spinning wheel and loom with us for anyone who would like to share the experience of times, embedded in ancient history.

After working at Mt Lyell Mine for forty-six years sitting at home was not an option for Stan, who started volunteering at the Galley Museum over ten years ago when the mine closed.

Stan has served as President of the volunteer management committee and is often seen up a ladder painting or repairing something that needs some tlc.

"I look forward to my two four-hour shifts at the "Galley" each week," Stan



said. "To everyone who is looking for a change, please consider the "Galley."

Stan's favourite rooms amongst the over 25 in the museum is the "War Room"

located on the first floor, which recognizes all our heroes, including Vietnam Veterans.

LEIGH PETTY

A long-time Queenstown resident, Leigh is a trained mechanic who worked for many years at Mt Lyell Mine

Leigh is well-known in the community for being a long-serving Lions Club volunteer and is one of the newest volunteers at the Galley Museum.

"I enjoy meeting people and had a few hours free each week and thought it

would be good to help at the Museum to do my bit to help keep it open," Leigh said.

As a new volunteer Leigh was mentored to learn the ropes and now has his own regular shift and also offers to cover shifts when other volunteers aren't available.







Conservation ecologist Barry Brook

Scientist Calls for Revised Predictions on Maugean Skate Population

Predictions regarding the decline of the endangered Maugean skate in Macquarie Harbour have been overstated, and further research is urgently required to guide conservation efforts more accurately, according to a University of Tasmania scientist.

Conservation ecologist Barry Brook, commissioned by Salmon Tasmania, reviewed existing projections of the skate's population over the coming decades.

In a letter to Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek, Professor Brook emphasised the need for more comprehensive research to provide a clearer outlook on the skate's future.

Brook noted that the 2023 Population Viability Analysis (PVA) of the Maugean

skate was hampered due to a methodology that may have exaggerated the projected decline in population.

"My analysis found that the reported outcomes from this modelling were essentially 'baked in' by the choices made when selecting the baseline parameters for the 2023 PVA," he said.

"This meant it was not predictive, and did not allow for proper assessment of either the causes of decline or the likely impact of conservation-management interventions.

In essence, Professor Brook argued that the outcomes of the 2023 PVA were predetermined and unreliable for drawing firm conclusions about the skate's future. He stressed the need to overhaul the entire process to ensure a more accurate and effective conservation plan for the species.

Brook recommended that the federal government fund two workshops to refine the population forecasts and conservation strategies.

Macquarie Harbour Oxygenation Project

The University of Tasmania recently announced that the Macquarie Harbour Oxygenation Project had successfully delivered and retained oxygen at depth, a development expected to benefit the Maugean skate.


"The loads and scale of delivery and effect are now quite significant, especially in the context of potentially improving bottom-water dissolved oxygen levels in target areas that are important Maugean skate habitat, and for offsetting the estimated demands of salmon aquaculture," IMAS Associate Professor Jeff Ross said.

On August 30, Leader of the Opposition, the Hon Peter Dutton MP joined salmon workwers in North West Tasmania so show his strong support for our industry.

Minister Dutton addressed a rally of salmon industry workers at DeBruyn Transport in Wesley Vale where he made it clear that he would do whatever it takes to ensure salmon farming continues to have a strong future in Macquarie Harbour.






Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

SON OF ZEEHAN MINE INSPECTOR DIES IN TRAMWAY ACCIDENT.

The citizens of Zeehan awoke on the morning of Friday, 17 February 1899, to the dreadful news that overnight Edward Bawden had been killed, another man badly maimed, and several others injured, all caused by a burst of steam at the New Mount Zeehan mine. Mine Manager Mathew Hosking was the grievously injured man and he passed away in the hospital at 9:15a.m. that morning.



Edward Bawden had been born in Cornwall in 1857, and had lived in Australia for 17 years, and Zeehan about eight months. His death had been instantaneous, as the jet of steam was found to have passed right through his body. One terrible aspect of the incident was the manner in which his two daughters, aged 16 and 18, first heard about his death. It was Bawden's very first shift at the mine, and his daughters prepared his supper for just after midnight, his anticipated finishing time. When he didn't arrive, and thinking their father was working a double shift, they went to bed. A little after 6 o'clock the next morning they got up to welcome him home, only to read of his sudden demise in the daily newspaper which had just been delivered!

Mathew Hosking was also a Cornwall na-

tive, and had been a resident of Zeehan for seven years. He was a Justice of the Peace, and was also heavily involved in the A.M.A., the Mine Managers' Association, the Loyal Orange Lodge, and the Primitive Methodist Church.

The New Mount Zeehan Mine was situated right in the heart of Zeehan, near the Frank Long memorial.

An inquiry was held that afternoon at the Hospital before coroner Mr E.L. Hall, a jury of seven, lawyers for the mining company and for the A.M.A., and James Harrison, Inspector of Mines.

The inquiry heard from three witnesses – William Richardson, Thomas Grubb and Christopher Hooper about the incident, and from William Calder about its aftermath and recovering the casualties.

Thomas Grubb, working mate of Bawden, said they were both about to knock off when Hosking called them over to assist. There was a loose pin on one of the safety valves of the boiler, and they attempted to bypass the valve by holding it down with four men leaning on two separate levers. Two attempts were made to put the pin in its place. On the third attempt after about two or three seconds a terrible explosion of steam took place. Grubb later saw Mr Hosking about 20 yards away from the boiler, and he was in a terrible condition. Hosking said he thought he was done for.

William Richardson, engine driver, said he did not examine the boiler to see if everything was right when he started his shift, but he thought that even if he had he would not have noticed the loose pin. It was only later on in his shift that he noticed the pin was loose. It was not possible for him to knock the pin into its place by himself.

He saw Mr Hosking and explained things

to him, and witness suggested the holding of the valve. Mr Hosking was the person who ordered the levers to be used. He remembered attempting to replace the pin and then nothing afterwards. At the time he thought it was safe to hold the valve down. He had changed his mind because two men were dead. He wished to God he had raked the fires out instead.

Christopher Hooper, engine driver, said he lit the fire in the boiler about 2 o'clock. It was his duty to inspect the boiler after firing, but that day he was too busy to have a proper look. He would have cut the boiler off and drawn the fire if he had discovered that the pin was out of place.

In reviewing the evidence Coroner Hall said the accident had not happened because of the loose pin, but from the method used to replace it. The engine driver admitted that one of his duties was to make an inspection on taking charge of the engine, and he had told Mr Hosking that he thought they could fix it without shutting the boiler down. If the jury thought the driver was reckless in adopting the means used without taking precautionary measures he was, in his opinion, responsible for the fatality.

After three quarters of an hour the jury returned their verdict which was condensed by the coroner to the following - "That the deceased came to his death through the negligence of the Mine Manager (Matthew Hosking)." The censuring of the engine drivers was added as a rider.

The funerals of the two men took place on the following Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m., with about 3,000 mourners, by far the largest attended funeral at Zeehan to that date. The Rev. J. Williams officiated both at the Primitive Methodist Church, and at the cemetery, where they were buried side by side.



After the church service, the Rev. Brother Heath read the impressive burial service of the Loyal Orange Lodge, the comrades of the deceased standing around the graves in a circle with two vacant places. The grave sites are known but neither has a headstone.




