Dear Editor,

Something must be done to stop greedy farmers from stealing water from the creeks, dams, and rivers in Circular Head. The unchecked use of bore water to fill massive dams is devastating the local environment and threatening the livelihoods of residents like myself.

I rely on Barcoo Creek for essential household water and fire safety, but last year, the creek that runs through my property dried up completely. This left me in a dangerous position during fire season and caused the tragic loss of wildlife—including platypuses, small fish, eels, lizards, and frogs. These ecosystems are being wiped out, and yet government authorities have ignored my repeated requests for intervention. Despite being assured that someone from Rivers and Waters or another department would investigate this theft, nothing has been done.

Even worse, my neighbour's actions appear to be a deliberate attempt to force me off my land by cutting off my water supply. As an Indigenous widow in my seventies, this should be classified as corporate bullying, elder abuse, and racial discrimination.

I have been reliably informed that a bore can deplete water from both above

and below ground within a 20-kilometre radius. From what I am experiencing, this is proving to be true. How long will authorities allow this theft to continue? Will it take a disaster before someone takes action?

I urge the relevant government departments to step in immediately and enforce fair water distribution before more lives—human and animal—are destroyed.

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Ex West Coaster, MP visits old stamping ground



Investing in new innovations and support for the region’s main industries were the focus of Tasmanian Labor MPs’ visit to the West Coast recently.

State Labor leader Dean Winter joined local Braddon MPs Anita Dow and Shane Broad to visit towns and local businesses across the region.

A highlight of the trip was a visit to Renison Mine, the largest tin producer in Australia.

Dr Broad, who is Labor’s resources spokesman, said Renison operator Blue-

stone Mines Tasmania Joint Venture was doing exciting things.

“The Rentails project is particularly exciting. This would be a massive project that aims to recover tin and copper from the tailings stored on site,” he said.

“This is a project that would help clean up an environmental legacy while recovering valuable metals and creating jobs. A real win-win.”

Renison has been a key part of the West Coast economy for more than 130 years and its waste storage forms one of

largest tin deposits in the nation.

“The mine employs approximately 500 people including contractors,” Dr Broad said.

“Innovative ideas like the Rentails project will make sure the mine operation remains strong into the future.

“We were really excited to hear about the plans for one of the big employers in the region,” Dr Broad said.

The visit was an opportunity for the team to reiterate Labor’s support for the main industries of the region, including salmon farming in Strahan where they caught up with locals and industry figures.

At the West Coast Wilderness Railway the MPs received an update on the iconic tourism attraction, which recently recorded its best passenger numbers in several years.

“Labor stands for good, secure local jobs for Tasmanians and we understand how important the visitor economy is,” said Ms Dow, the party’s deputy leader.

“It’s wonderful to see visitors flocking to this special part of the state.”

The MPs also met with West Coast Council Mayor Shane Pitt to hear about the recent bushfire emergency and its impact.

Mr Winter, who hails from Queenstown, received a special West Coast item.

His late father, Murray, was originally recruited from New Zealand to work on the Queenstown mine but also to lead the West Coast rugby club.

The last president of the club, Kevin Mathewson, gave Mr Winter one of the famous Green Machine jerseys dating back to the 1980s when Murray was still playing for the team.

“I was chuffed to take it home. It means a lot to me and my young family and I am so proud of my West Coast roots,” Mr Winter said.



First glimpse at future North West Mental Health Precinct

The concept designs for the new Mental Health Precinct at the North West Regional Hospital have been released.

Minister for Mental Health and Well-being, Roger Jaensch, said the \$40 million project forms part of Stage 1 of the North West Hospitals Masterplan.

The new North West Mental Health Precinct will be located to the south of the North West Regional Hospital main entrance, on a greenfield site near the recently constructed Burnie Ambulance Station.

“The Mental Health Precinct will provide essential acute mental health services and will support contemporary, best practice models of care and reflect modern standards in mental health facility design,” Minister Jaensch said.

“The design includes a 22-bed mental health inpatient unit plus a five-bed short stay unit to replace the current Spencer Clinic.

The inpatient unit will provide a safe and supportive environment for individuals in crisis, ensuring they receive immediate care and treatment.”

The proposed building will feature access from the existing internal hospital road network to a welcoming main entrance foyer, providing direct access to acute services, clinical appointments, and inpatient visitors in a respectful and inviting manner.

Parking with easy access to the building is included, and the design will feature healing gardens to allow staff, patients, and visitors to engage with therapeutic landscapes.

“The Tasmanian Government is delivering record investment to improve the mental health of our community as part of our 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania’s Future,” Minister Jaensch said.

“An enormous \$320 million is being invested in our Mental Health Infrastructure Program through the 2024/25 Budget.”

Subject to achieving the necessary approvals, construction is expected to begin in late 2025 with completion in 2027.

Heritage listing for visitor centre

The West Coast Visitor Information Centre in Strahan has received a permanent listing on the Tasmanian Heritage Register.

In November 2024 the Centre was provisionally entered on the Heritage Register, with the listing made permanent in late February.

The listing relates to the building itself, the Reflections Exhibition inside the Centre, and the amphitheatre where The Ship That Never Was is performed.

As a result of the permanent listing the planned refurbishment as part of the Strahan Waterfront Precinct Redevelopment has been adapted to meet new requirements.

The heritage listing requires specific approvals for internal and external works, including those that would bring the Centre up to modern accessibility standards.

Council is looking at what works can proceed within the parameters of the heritage listing, with options to be considered once we have a better understanding of the timeline following engagement with stakeholders.

- Council is now considering:
 - How to move forward with refurbishing the Centre to ensure it is safe and accessible
 - How to preserve and reimagine the Reflections Exhibition, with some items in very poor condition

How to fund any approved future works, with current funding not enough to cover expected new project requirements

The impact of a longer closure on the operations of the West Coast Visitor Information Centre, who have moved to operate out of a smaller, temporary location

Council will continue to seek advice and move forward as much as possible to ensure the Centre can be reopened.

Helping Tasmanians make their home more energy efficient

More than 6100 loans have been processed to help Tasmanians make their homes more energy efficient.

Minister for Energy and Renewables, Nick Duigan, said it was exciting to highlight the success of the Energy Saver Loan Scheme, which are delivering real and tangible energy savings to Tasmanians.

"Since 2022, the scheme has seen more than 6100 successful loans, which is a fantastic result," Minister Duigan said. "This scheme allows energy efficiency upgrades to be accessed by a wider variety of consumers, with a wider variety of budgets."

The Scheme is helping Tasmanian's reap benefits sooner, allowing consumers to achieve immediate energy savings upon installation, whilst paying off upgrades with no-interest, over a 3-year loan term.

The Australian Energy Regulator recently said Tasmania has some of the highest uptake rates of rooftop solar in the country, and it's schemes like this that are making that happen.

"Energy affordability is a key part of our Government's 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future. I am pleased to see and hear the positive impacts that our policies are having on consumers," Minister Duigan said.

Planned Burning Program 2025

What is a planned burn?

Planned burns are carried out by Sustainable Timber Tasmania to regenerate harvested forests, in a similar manner to the natural regeneration process that follows a bushfire. These burns also help to enhance community safety by reducing fuel loads in Tasmania's public production forests.

How many burns are there?

This year, approximately 140 burns are planned across Permanent Timber Production Zone (PTPZ) land.

Why are planned burns undertaken in autumn?

Autumn is the optimal time for planned burns. The conditions are safer, with lower risk of fire escaping due to cooler temperatures and reduced extreme weather. It is also the ideal time for eucalypt seedlings to grow, because of the warm temperatures and onset of regular rainfall.

What happens during a planned burn?

The Program is managed to prioritise safety and minimise impact to neighbours and local communities. Each individual burn is carefully planned for safety, smoke dispersal, protection of assets, infrastructure, special values, and consideration of known local events. These factors are documented, reviewed, and approved along with individual risk assessments. Planned burns are only undertaken when weather conditions are suitable for managing and containing the fire to the prepared boundaries.

How is smoke managed?

Sustainable Timber Tasmania coordinates its planned burns with other agencies and private forestry businesses with the aim to manage smoke levels in accordance with the Coordinated Smoke Management System, administered by the Forest Practices Authority.

Wherever possible, smoke dispersal is planned away from populated areas. Although smoke may be visible, it is usually travelling at height and impact to local communities is minimised. On days when poor smoke dispersal is anticipated, burning is postponed until suitable weather conditions prevail.

How will I know when planned burns are happening?

Before any burns occur, Sustainable Timber Tasmania notifies and engages with immediate neighbours during the planning stage. Stakeholders who have registered interest in specific burns, including those in the wine and tourism industries, are also informed. Public advisories are shared with local media and posted to Sustainable Timber Tasmania's Facebook page twice daily. Additionally, updates and the full Planned Burning Program are available on the "What's Burning Now?" page at www.fire.tas.gov.au.

Honey saved by firefighters



Tasmanian and interstate firefighters saved the Leatherwood Honey industry from the worst of Tasmania's recent West Coast bushfires.

During summer the northwest and west coast regions of Tasmania host around 20,000 beehives.

Tasmanian Beekeepers Association president, Lindsay Bourke, said "the 2024/25 summer has been very difficult for the producers, with low nectar production by the Leatherwood trees, leading to low honey volumes.

Thanking the Minister for Parks and Environment, Nick Duigan and Tasmania Fire Service District Officer, Mark Brownrigg in person, Mr Bourke said the firefighters literally saved the industry. "The West Coast bushfires have compounded matters, with smoke affecting the bees and, in some cases, fires consuming the hives.

"The west coast fires are not only a direct danger to bees but can also be devastating to the leatherwood trees and the fragile rainforest environments in which they are found. Heavy smoke also affects the bees, as they can't navigate to find sources of nectar.

"Through the amazing efforts of firefighters, almost all hives have come through the fires relatively unscathed.

"At this point, only eight hives have

been confirmed as lost. When you consider how many hives there are in the region, this is an amazing result and an absolutely stellar effort by firefighters.

'Sadly, though, some groves of Leatherwood trees have been destroyed and reduced to ash.

"This is a long-term loss that will take generations to replace, which confirms how rare and fragile our unique Leatherwood resource really is.

"We can't thank the Tasmanian and interstate firefighters enough, they put themselves in harm's way to literally save our industry.

"I know all the members of the Tasmanian Beekeepers Association extend their heartfelt thanks to the dedicated people who saved the day for us and our industry." Mr Bourke said.

Mr Bourke said all Tasmanians and the Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management, Felix Ellis can be truly proud of the firefighting efforts over the summer.

He added that Leatherwood honey producers are very resilient, and they will be working hard to rebuild where possible.

Honey lovers can be assured that supplies of Leatherwood honey will not be affected, as beekeepers have stock in reserve.

West Coast communities benefit from Hydro Tasmania funding

Three community organisations working hard to bring lasting benefits to their local communities are the recipients of Hydro Tasmania's West Coast Funding Program.

The Zeehan Netball Association, Thrive Group Child Care and Early Learning and Zeehan Golf Club each shared in a total of \$10,000 towards community-based projects and programs.

Children on the West Coast will have access to six mobile playgroup sessions through the funding provided to Thrive Group.

Thrive Group CEO Ed Beswick said the organisation would be partnering with Playgroup Tasmania to deliver the sessions in Zeehan, Strahan and Rosebery.

"We are thrilled to receive this support from Hydro Tasmania, which allows Thrive Group and Playgroup Tasmania to build on the amazing work already being done by these services on the West Coast," said Mr Beswick.

"By working collaboratively with local services and playgroups, we will provide additional professional support, resources and early learning opportunities for children and families."

The Zeehan Netball Association runs netball programs for women and children across the West Coast.

Zeehan Netball Association Treasurer Aleisha Maskell said their allocated funds would be used to assist with stadium hire, purchase new equipment like netballs, whistles and bibs, and provide new players with uniforms featuring the Hydro Tasmania logo.

"It gives the kids something to look



forward to in the colder winter months and it keeps them active, fit, healthy and happy," said Ms Maskell.

"We like to keep the junior program free to remove any financial barriers for parents and encourage kids to have a go, and this funding helps tremendously."

The final funding recipient, the Zeehan Golf Club, will use its allocated funding to upgrade facilities used to host community events.

The West Coast Funding Program is part of Hydro Tasmania's Community Benefit Sharing Program.

The program is designed to help fund grass-roots community initiatives and recognise the importance of Tasmania's West Coast communities for Hydro Tasmania.

QantasLink's New Era Takes Off at Burnie Airport

Wynyard, Tasmania

Burnie Airport welcomed the arrival of its first QantasLink Dash 8 Q400 aircraft on Sunday, 30 March, marking a major step forward for regional air travel on Tasmania's North West Coast.

The 74-seat aircraft replaces the older Q300 model and brings faster travel times, lower emissions, and significantly more passenger capacity. The move is part of QantasLink's shift to an all-Q400 fleet.

Airport infrastructure has been upgraded to support the new aircraft, enhancing both safety and performance. The increased capacity is expected to benefit tourism, especially eco-travel to destinations like the Tarkine and Cradle Mountain, while also supporting future FIFO demand from major renewable energy projects.

The new service will add more than 6,000 seats per year between Burnie and Melbourne, strengthening Burnie Airport's role as a key transport hub for the region and boosting accessibility for visitors and businesses alike.



Community Grant Supports Future Lifesavers at Boat Harbour Beach

The Boat Harbour Beach Surf Life Saving Club (BHBSLSC) has received a welcome boost to its junior training program, thanks to a \$2,000 Community Activation Grant proudly presented by Waratah-Wynyard Councillor Kevin Hyland.

The funding has enabled the club to purchase ten foam training boards for its youngest participants—known as the "Periwinkles."

The program is an important stepping stone for nurturing water safety skills and surf awareness in the region's youngest residents.

Twelve Periwinkles took to the waves each Sunday morning throughout the season, supported by a dedicated team

of volunteers and parents. The junior program also saw strong participation overall, with 45 local children enjoying the benefits of beach-based education and fitness.

At the helm of the Periwinkles is 16-year-old coach Nina Vincent, a shining example of the club's impact. Nina first joined BHBSLSC as a Nipper at age seven and has recently achieved her Bronze Medallion—an important milestone in lifesaving proficiency.

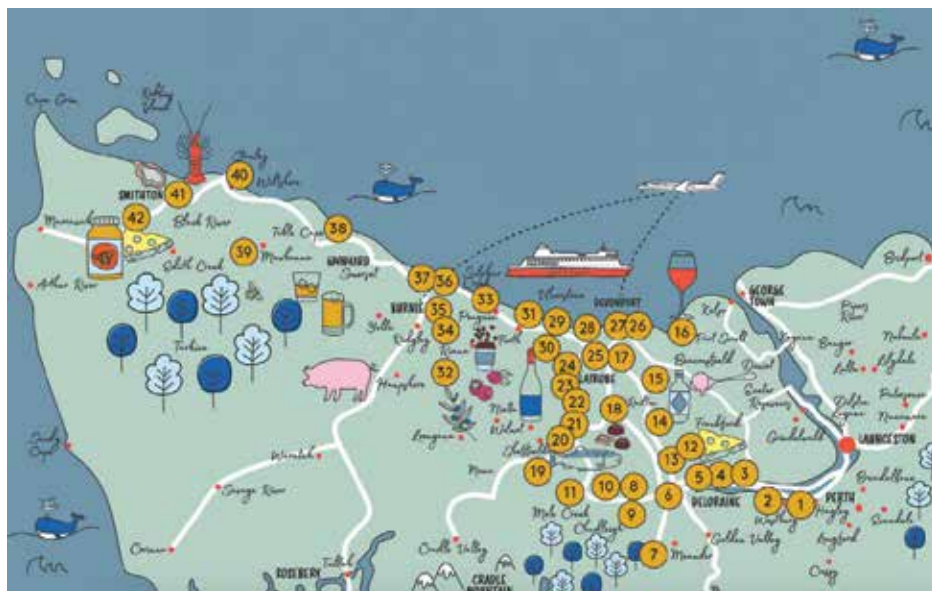

The ‘right’ decision in Tassie

Heading across Bass Strait on the Spirit of Tasmania ferry, I sat on a sunlit chair with a map in front of me. While I had a rough idea where I wanted to go on my Tassie tour, there was still one key decision to make. When I disembark in Devonport, do I turn left, straight ahead or right?

I made the ‘right’ decision. Ten days touring from Devonport to Hobart gave me a fantastic experience immersed in the western wilderness of Tasmania. Pristine lakes and rivers, fern-filled valleys, craggy mountain peaks and historic towns provided plenty of spectacular scenery.

Not far out of Devonport in the hamlet of Wilmot is a lookout with the quintessential Tassie view of craggy mountain peaks over a lake.

Further south west of Cradle Mountain, the tiny town of Tullah was an unexpected treat. With a cute cottage full of teddy bears, a tiny steam train, a quirky café

and a lakeside lodge, along with Lake Rosebery and Lake Mackintosh, Tullah offered more than one would expect from such a small place.

Rosebery has a community garden and opshop overflowing with quirky trash and treasure items that could make a unique souvenir. I found some delicious, dehydrated meals there for a bargain price. Weeks later I still wish I'd bought the lot.

If you've ever watched the ABC series Bay of Fires, then you'll recognise some familiar sights in Zeehan, Strahan and Queenstown. Yes, there's the cruises, the big railway trip, the local community theatre production and other well-advertised tourist attractions.

If you're like me though, you will appreciate the small, quirky, random, offbeat nature of each town.

Like I said to a friend. “The west coast of Tasmania is like a cross between Virgin River and Northern Exposure. The famous Tassie hospitality and friendliness combined with a dash of wild west attitude and individuality.”

The best travel experiences are usually the ones we stumble into, not the ones we meticulously plan. That was certainly the case in the wild west of Tassie. Things like:

- Coming across a mountainside apiary surrounded by forests, the beehives stood in a circle like a honey-themed Stonehenge
- Finding a huge pile of serpentine mineral rocks with layers of striking green



colours flashing through them in the sunshine

- Taking a ride on a tiny steam train through fern-filled gullies; Searching through quirky treasures in tiny town opshops
- Having an entire lake to myself while kayaking, and
- Sipping on a local cherry cider while taking in views of old growth forests as far as the eye can see.

Ticking off the big-ticket tourist spots on the map is one way of travelling. While that is part of any trip, for me, taking the road less travelled, slowing down, and appreciating the unexpected moments of discovery along the way is the right decision.



Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

A single Anzac soldier interred

The First World War (1914-18) saw many men (perhaps around 500) from Zeehan enlist in the armed forces. Sapper William (Billy) Birch was one of them. Born in Launceston on 9 April 1865, he married Fanny Hills in 1891 and together they had three daughters - Leah (1892), Ruth (1898) and Maud (1903).

In 1914 the family was living at the corner of Adams and Shaw Streets, Zeehan. In November 1915, then living at 297 Main Street, William enlisted in the army. He was 5ft 5ins (165cm) tall and weighed 10 stone 7 pounds (67 kg). A miner by trade, a preliminary medical examination found him to be 'Fit for Active Service in Mining Corps only'. He was considered to be "Unfit for military infantry service - tachycardia (fast heart rate) - perhaps due to excessive smoking."

On 16 December 1915 at Claremont, William was appointed to 3rd Company Miners and on 18 December he left Tasmania for the Casula Camp near Liverpool, New South Wales where the 1st Mining Corps was forming up and training. Following a farewell parade in the Domain, the Australian Mining Corps embarked from Sydney on the 20 February 1916 on board HMAT Ulysses. The Mining Corps comprised 1303 members at the time they embarked being a Headquarters of 40; No.1 Com-

pany - 390; No.2 Company - 380; No.3 Company - 392, and 101 members of the 1st Reinforcements. The Ulysses arrived in Melbourne on 22 February, and departed on 1 March, then sailed to Fremantle, where a further 53 members of the Corps were embarked. Following an incident and a delay of about a month for repairs, the Ulysses sailed for the European Theatre on 1 April 1916.

The ship arrived at Suez, Egypt on 22 April, and the men continued to Hazebrouck in France where they arrived on 8 May 1916.

As a "Mining Corps" did not fit in the British Expeditionary Force military organisation, the Corps was disbanded, and three Australian Tunnelling Companies were formed. No.3 Company became the 3rd Australian Tunnelling Company (3ATC).

William was on active duty with 3ATC from May 1916 for about eighteen months. During this time his unit was involved in the battle of Fromelles, and at Laventie-Fauquissart, Givenchy, Loos, Lens, Double Crassiers and Vermelles and other places on the Western Front.

On 27 November 1916 at the 'Black Watch Sap', Hill 70, an explosion occurred which killed 20 members of William's company, while the next day two more men were killed.

William reported sick on 9 August 1917 and was admitted to the 11th Canadian

Field Ambulance with chronic bronchitis. He was discharged and rejoined his unit on 14 August.

He again reported sick on 26 September 1917 this time with myalgia (muscular pain caused by strain, inflammation or heavy exertion) and after treatment he returned to his unit some three weeks later.

Eight days later William again reported sick suffering from rheumatism. He was transferred to an Ambulance Train, then to a General Hospital, a Convalescent Depot, and then to the Australian General Base Depot. On 31 October it was decided to evacuate William to England for 'permanent base duties' due to his age and rheumatism. On 12 January 1918 he sailed for Australia on board Hospital Transport SS Port Darwin.

Disembarking at Melbourne on 4 March 1918, William then travelled by steamer to Tasmania and returned to Zeehan on 6 March 1918 where he was welcomed home by Warden Fisher at the Zeehan railway station. The Warden congratulated him on having responded to the Empire's call, and also upon his safe return and trusted that his health would improve. Three cheers were given, and William, with his wife and family, were driven home by Mrs George Dunkley.

William was discharged from the A.I.F. on 4 April 1918, classed as 30% disabled and entitled to a pension. Having "done

his bit" and more.

William passed away on Saturday, 19 January 1924 at his residence, 48 Counsel Street, aged 59 years, his early death possibly hastened by his arduous service in France. His funeral took place at 4 p.m. on the following Monday afternoon, with the Methodist Reverend R. Jackson

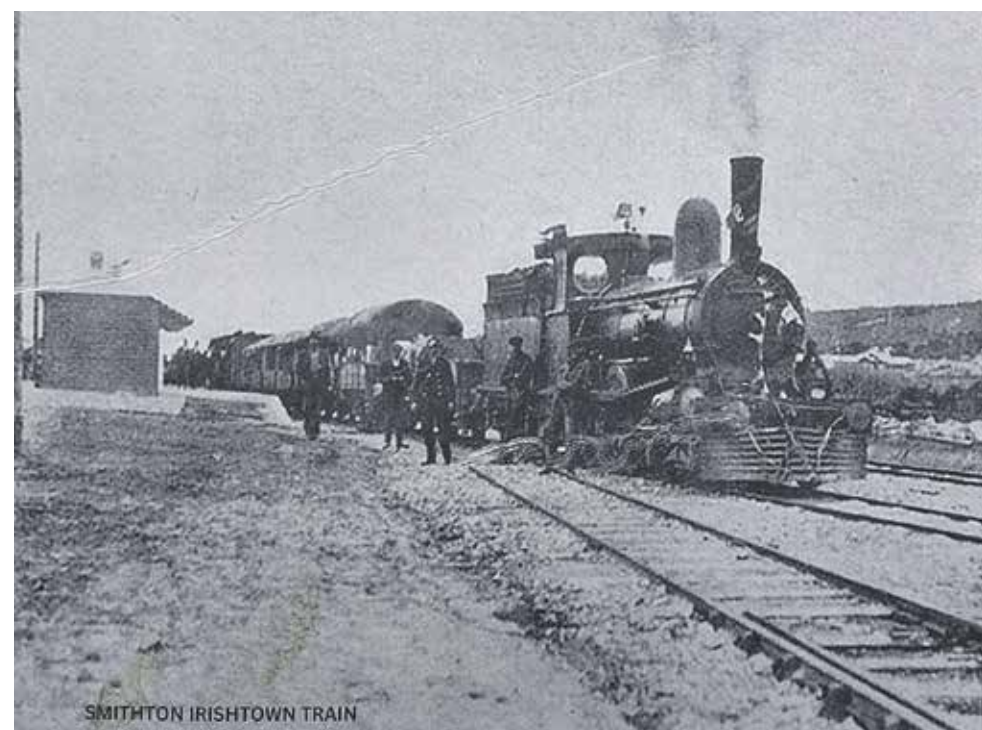


officiating. His wife Fanny wore black mourning clothes from that day for the rest of her life and visited his grave every Sunday. William's headstone, although damaged, is still visible today.

One other Anzac soldier is remembered in the cemetery. There is a memorial plaque to Alexander Yates who was killed in France on April 5th, 1918.

This is an abridged excerpt based on an article by Kay Wagland and taken from books edited by Malcolm Ready, Burials at the Zeehan General (Pioneer) Cemetery.

What's happening at the Circular Head Heritage Centre?



The latest exhibition is "Circular Head Rail and beyond"

This exhibition includes wooden tramways and trains used by the first timbermen of the region. Also, the Marrawah tramway which was converted to rail about 1925.

The regions rail lines began in Stanley to Wiltshire and eventually linked to Myalla and Wynyard approximately 1922. The other line also meandered its way through farmland at Wiltshire, through Mengha to Fahey's Lane to Irishtown, through Edith Creek to Roger River as the Trowutta Station. Then the missing

link from Irishtown to Smithton was created in 1921.

The rail system of Circular Head was very busy though out the 1930s,40s, 50s and 60s. This included freight and passengers.

Unfortunately, as better roads and more affordable vehicles became popular, it became unviable for the government system. Throughout the 1970s and early 80s, cargo consisted of superphosphate and logs. Eventually road transport took over the movement of freight and the rail closed.

We also have on loan from Dale Kings-

ton, a small Garratt engine. During the period of 1984 to 2000, the Kingston family had a public railway called Cuba Park Railway. This was extremely popular with visitors, and we also have a video from that time. The Kingston family were exceptional engineers and created all their own engines and rail.

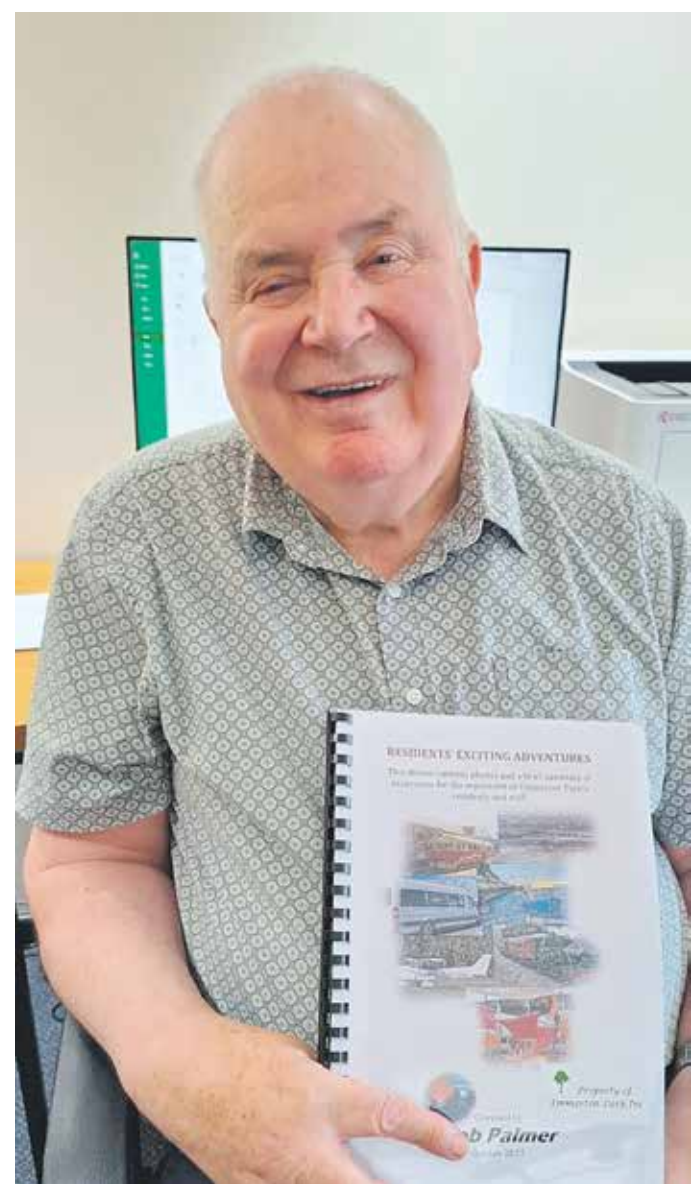

Growing up in the picturesque town of Queenstown, I recall my childhood with fondness, especially the family bushwalks and picnics, taking the billy of course for a cuppa.

"I had a pretty normal upbringing." "Queenstown was a lively place back then. There were five or six hotels, an RSL, and a thriving local business scene."

I attended St Joseph's School and Murrays High School, where my days were filled with growing up and making memories. After finishing school, I began my career with an apprenticeship at Mt Lyell

Butchery, where I worked for four to five years. Later I worked at the Four Seasons Motel, where I was assistant manager for a time.

I met Wendy Anne Reid, a local girl, whom I married in 1970. Together we shared a love of old-time dances and raised two sons, Damien and Wade. Together, we enjoyed a beautiful 54 years of marriage, until Wendy sadly passed away last year.

Later, we all relocated to Tullah, continuing my work as a butcher at the Farmers Supermarket there. My family and I later moved to Stanley, I continued my butchery work there, but unfortunately in 1982 I suffered a stroke which brought different challenges my way. In 2013, I relocated to Emmerton Park, where I have since found new adventures.

During my time at Emmerton Park, I have embarked on a project to capture my experiences in a way I had never done before: writing a book. "Residents Exciting Adventures" contains 27 chapters, filled with photos and summaries of the excursions and overnight trips that I and fellow residents have enjoyed. The book was launched last year, and during the launch, the Smithton Library presented me with a certificate to Honor all my efforts. They even purchased a copy to be archived in Hobart.

Currently, I am working on my next

book, Memories of the Park, which will hopefully be released next year sometime. "I'll be going on another two-night, three-day trip to Launceston and St Helens at the end of this month, I'm sure it will make for an interesting chapter in both my life and my book."

My life has been a series of adventures, each one leaving its mark. From my childhood in Queenstown to his recent adventures at Emmerton Park. "There are many more adventures to come."

SERVES 4 🍴

METHOD

Preheat oven to 200 degrees.

Over a gentle heat, melt the butter in a medium saucepan, add the flour and stir until smooth. Using a whisk, add the milk stirring continuously until thoroughly mixed and there are no lumps. Increase heat to medium and cook the mixture for 3 minutes, while keeping stirring. Add the salmon, dill, capers, and spring onions. Remove from heat, season to taste and set aside to cool.

Remove the puff pastry from the package and allow to soften. Place one piece of the pastry into a lightly greased 25cm pie dish. Gently pour the milk and salmon mixture onto the pastry. Cover the pie with the second piece of puff pastry dough. Fold the edges over to seal and crimp the edges. Brush the top of the pastry with beaten egg then bake for 30 minutes until the pastry is golden.

Attendees also participated in speed careering and had the chance to learn about what it’s like working for Hydro Tasmania and get tips on applying for a job and navigating the interview process.

Workskills Youth Programs Manager Sophie Calic said many program participants had left school early and missed out on similar opportunities.

“Hydro Tasmania has collaborated with us to create an experience that meets participants where they are at, offering real industry exposure, skill-building, and a glimpse into career possibilities they may not have considered,” said Ms Calic.

“This program is a great example of how industry can play a crucial role in giving young people exposure to the labour market, insight into what employers need, and the confidence

to take their next steps.”

Sophie Sproule, 18, said the program had opened her eyes to the many career possibilities at Hydro Tasmania and she was now interested in a career as a maintenance assistant.

“You get to experience new things that you didn’t think you’d be interested in.

That has opened my mind a lot because you don’t realise how many jobs there actually are within the one industry,” said Ms Sproule.

“I would like to try a maintenance assistant role, I think there are lots of different opportunities within that.”

Day two saw the group make the journey to Edgar Dam, an important part of the mighty Gordon-Pedder hydropower scheme where a major upgrade is currently underway.

Participants were given the unique opportunity to shadow real jobs within the power station and around the dam site with roles like dam maintenance, on-site labour tasks, drone flying, civil construction, water testing and environmental controls, and project planning and engineering.

Tasmanian contractor Hall Earthmoving is carrying out the upgrade at Edgar Dam and Director Chris Hall and Site Supervisor Tim Barker were there to give attendees hands-on experience of a live worksite.

Martin Bennett, 24, said the program had shown him career pathways he hadn’t considered before.

“I didn’t know anything a couple of days ago, now I know a lot about dams and how they work,” said Mr Bennett.

“There are definitely a couple of different pathways there that I can see a career through – it’s good. I can see myself working here, there are a lot of great people who support each other.”

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PARTON ME JOLENE! - OPENING NIGHT REVIEW

“Cradle Coast Theatre presents PARTON ME JOLENE!

Conceived, written and directed by Northwest Theatre stalwart, Sid Sidebottom, Parton Me Jolene! opened it's 10 show season to a generous and supportive audience at Devonport's Town Hall Theatre on Friday night. Sidebottom's solid understanding of what attracts a Northwest audience continues with this third instalment off the back of Cradle Coast Theatre's highly popular 'Ring of Fire' in 2022 and 'On the Road Again' in 2023.

The 'Concert Theatre' genre is narrated by well-known performer, choreographer, director and playwright, Michelle Best. Her character, 'Lynetta' guides the audience by providing facts, opinions

and insight into the origin of each song. Best masterfully weaves the audience around her little finger through banter and her quick-witted humour. Best states that she has always been drawn to creative and unconventional theatre and here, she is in her element! I felt like we were sharing a cuppa around her record player as she treated us to her favourite playlist.

The 30 sad, glad and badass song celebration of the best of US Women of Country begins with cast member Sherry Rand, born with Country Music pulsing in her veins, as she belts out the first verse, effortlessly, of Dolly Parton's 1974 smash hit, Jolene. The fact that Rand's impeccable vocals are the first we hear is not wasted on those that are

fully aware of her country music roots. From the first notes the audience are tapping their feet, shimmying shoulders as the wave of familiar tunes wash over them.

A simple set created by Max Darvell and Belinda Gunson reflects the earthiness of country with wood grain frames featuring vibrant faces of US Women of Country. The audience is also treated to a full view of the polished, tight, professional 7-piece onstage band capably led by Musical Director, Wayne Rand.

A strong sense of celebrating community talent goes beyond just the performers and musicians we see onstage to the crafty digital imagery designed by VCA graduate and home-grown theatre designer, Theo Viney. These audio-visual effects assist the audience to connect the themes of infidelity, marriage, raising a family, substance abuse and the overall resilience of women to the lyrics of the selected musical numbers.

But the absolute standout of the show is without a doubt, the immense vocal talent of the five cast members, Sherry Rand, Annette Dawes, Tash Turner, Libby Dobson and Laura Auton. Wow!!! Adorned with a carefully selected wardrobe of belt buckles, tassels, bell bottom jeans, fringed vests, hats, denim, leather and lace, these ladies looked as good as they sounded!

Highlights are certainly 'Delta Dawn', the first time we hear all five voices together, with the 'cherry on top' being the

moments of sublime acapella. Other absolute show stoppers amongst the immense catalogue of numbers are Laura Auton's rendition of 'Here You Come Again', Libby Dobson's, 'D.I.V.O.R.C.E', Tash Turner's 'Walk the Line' and 'House of the Rising Sun' and the powerhouse that is Annette Dawes with her rendition of, 'You Light Up My Life'. What a voice. And... we all need a pair of red high heels, if you know what I mean!!!! Sass!

There is no greater definition of 'couple goals' than when Sherry Rand mesmerises us with, 'He Stopped Loving Her Today', accompanied by Musical Director, Wayne Rand with his acoustic guitar, topped off with stunning harmonies by Annette Dawes.

I did tear up during 'Bonfire at Tina's', watching such a tight cast who clearly trust and know one another so well, give themselves over fully to the moment. Harmonies to die for.

Although they are presenting a show about U.S. female country music powerhouses, you can't help but feel a sense of pride for what these five local women are capable of, in the middle of their normal, everyday lives. There is so much talent here, on our doorstep, and Cradle Coast Theatre have served it up on a platter for us to enjoy. Get along and support them. Yee Ha!!!

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Our Tassie branches get behind an important cause



Tommy Quick was 12 when his life changed forever. The last thing he recalls is lying down with a headache. When he woke up five weeks later Tommy couldn't speak, and he had to learn to use his body again. He'd had a stroke.

A stroke occurs when blood cannot get to all parts of the brain. It can happen at any age and can injure the brain of impacted individuals. Childhood stroke affects more than 500 children and babies in Australia every year.

In recent years Tommy has cycled to the four points of Australia to highlight the incidence of young stroke, covering 9,889 kilometres in total.

During his four points ride in 2021, Tommy was hit by a car. He sustained significant injuries and learned to walk for the third time, but Tommy won't let anything hold him down. He's back and already cycling the three points of Tasmania – his toughest challenge yet!

Bendigo Bank's, Ashdon Capp, State Manager, Regional Victoria and Tasmania is joined Tommy's Tasmania ride on Thursday 20 March for the trip from Penguin to Wynyard on Tasmania's North West Coast.

Ashdon met Tommy ten years ago and has been following Tommy's work to raise awareness and funds for stroke victims.

"I have learnt through Tommy that strokes are something that affect young people as well as older Australians, and that the long-term effects can be devastating. I want to be involved in creating a greater understanding of this condition, and particularly the need to support those affected by stroke at a young age," says Ashdon.

"I have a close friend who had a stroke at age 23 who was able to make a reasonably full recovery due to the quick actions of others at the scene who recognised the symptoms."

BEN is proud to sponsor Tommy's ride, and our 18 Tasmanian branches are contributing an additional \$5000 donation. We also held a Plain-Clothes day on Friday 14 March, with our local Tasmanian branch teams wearing green - the colour of the Stroke Foundation - to raise more funds.

"Twelve of our branches along the route are also assisting in other ways. And around 30 BEN employees will be supporting Tommy at various events in stages of the trip."

"Tommy is very focused on sharing his story - and the fact that stroke in young people and their care is an issue that deserves more attention. I encourage you to visit the 4 Points website, donate if you can, and learn more about young stroke and Tommy's personal journey," says Ashdon.

Over the three days, she showed them how to create a collection policy, and begin cataloguing the huge collection that the Heritage Centre has. On the third day, Christine Winskill from MMG popped in to share some stories of Rosebery and the history of the Heritage Centre before it moved to its forever home

at the band hall. There are five more three day training visits planned for the remainder of the year. In these the volunteers will learn how to clean the displays properly without damaging items, also, how to store pieces and display them for the public to see. The training is funded by Arts Tasmanias Roving Curator grants round. The Rosebery Development Association are excited to see what improvements their freshly trained volunteers can make to the Heritage Centre

and the collection to help preserve and display it at its best. Donation of interesting heritage items with relevant history are gratefully accepted. The Rosebery Heritage Centre is open weekdays from 10am until 2pm. Drop in and have a look at the exciting collection one day soon.

First Bass Strait crossing by plane

One of the most fascinating aviation stories involves Lieutenant Arthur L. Long who completed the first flight across Bass Strait from Stanley to Melbourne in 1919. Arthur was born at Forcett (Tas) in 1896, eldest son of Thomas and Amy (nee Palfreyman), who was a travelling salesman with Palfreyman's drapery store, Hobart, run by his uncles, before he enlisted in WWI.

He served four and half years in the Australian Imperial Forces (AIF) and after passing through various aviation courses he joined the Australian Flying Corps No. 2 Squadron. After the war he spent six months at a training course on aeronautics and commercial aviation. He knew there was great potential for commercial aviation back home in Tasmania.

Long ordered a purpose built Boulton Paul P9 plane to be built in England for civilian use; a two seater plane made of ply and canvas with dual controls so it could be flown from either position. It had a wing span of 27ft and length 25ft. The BP factory built another seven P9 planes. Long packed the plane in to ten crates and had it shipped to Australia. He constructed the plane at the Elwick Show Grounds and his many feats included:

- Advertising of the Peace Loan Fund in Tasmania
- Performing aerial stunts – roll overs
- Making first ever commercial passenger flight between Hobart and Launceston
- Making the first aerial newspaper delivery when the publishers of the Mercury challenged the Examiner to see who could deliver papers to Deloraine first. Mr McKenzie, a journalist with the Mercury, surrounded by papers, flew with Long from Hobart dropping papers at small towns along the way and waving to

excited school children. But due to poor visibility and a faulty compass, they had veered off course to Maria Island. Long dropped below the clouds and navigated his way back to Ross one and a half hours behind schedule. The Examiner arrived with their newspapers by car at Deloraine 3 hours before Long.

- Making numerous photographic expe-

Ford of Highfield. He considered the area to be an ideal landing field as it was on high ground with no encumbrances. His arrival caused quite a stir among the inhabitants of Stanley with the local headmaster bringing his delighted school children to view the plane. (Photo with school children surrounding the plane) It is said that one of the boys guarded the plane overnight sleeping under the wing. The next morning the weather improved so at 6.30am he set off with his mechanic, O.J. (Jack) Howard, who had trav-

arriving four hours and 10 minutes after take off. He averaged 70mph with an average height of 1,500ft, maximising at 2,000ft.

Arthur Long had messages from the Governor of Tasmania for the Governor General; was received by Melbourne's Lord Mayor and congratulated by the Prime Minister. Back in Tasmania, he received accolades from the Tasmanian Government. He has gone down in history as a pioneer of commercial aviation. Arthur Long did attempt to get an airline off the ground in 1920-21; Aviation Ltd with 4-5 aircraft, but the enterprise was short lived. Long went on to become a stockbroker and grazier in Victoria and died there in 1954.

There was the unveiling of a commemorative replica of the Boulton Paul P9 plane Lt Long flew at Lane's Lookout, Stanley on 15th December 2019 to mark this historic aviation event. The Stanley Museum also houses information and a book Bridging the Strait by Pirrie Shield that was produced especially for the occasion.

One day he noticed in a local paper that there was to be a return trip from Melbourne to Launceston landing at Stanley. Being thoroughly Tasmanian, Long wanted this epic trip to be completed by a Tasmanian. With no time to waste, he added an extra fuel tank and set off for Stanley (the closest point to the mainland) on the 15th December from Launceston and due to bad weather tied the plane down in a paddock owned by Mr

elled to Stanley by car, spinning the propeller to start the engine. Long followed the Three Hummock island and King Island, landing briefly at Torquay to top the engine oil up with engine ticking over and propeller spinning. A cord had been rigged to up to release the engine oil but broke leaving his engine seriously short of oil.

He did experience variable wind conditions and turbulence which did slow him down but he continued on to Port Melbourne, landing at Fishermen's Bend,

Round one in the CHFA had all four club's unite together to promote mental health. Local Mental health organisations spent the day communicating with locals and providing the necessary information.

The First senior game kicked off at 4pm with reigning premiers Redpa taking on Forest/Stanley. Forest/Stanley took the early lead 25 points at the main break. Demon Lucas Ford played at his best with Redpa unable to find a matchup to hold him back as he finished the day with 6 Goals. Redpa were sluggish all day unable to score any easy goals, with coach Josh Gale kicking the only 2 goals for Redpa as they walked off the ground with a 104-point loss.

After the first senior match all four clubs, umpires, CHFA executive, spectators and CH Saints were also asked to join as they united in a circle on the ground as Scotchtown President Josh Smith spoke

strongly "United about our approach and commitment to working together.

Also, we are united in our thinking about creating an environment where mental health amongst our people is not just spoken about, but where we highlight the ways in our community where a person who is struggling with mental health can receive the help that they need.

We know that it takes a large amount of courage to say that you're struggling. And so, by naming the places where we can get help and support out loud tonight... hopefully this opens conversations and more importantly shows that there is hope.

Please remember, there is no shame in asking for help.

If you have a mate who is battling in this way, please know that it is a weight that you do not have to carry alone. There are people in our community and

beyond who are trained, prepared and ready to help you and your mate. Here are the supporters in our community that are represented here today:

STICH (Stronger Together In Circular Head) - beanies in collaboration with McCain's & Andy Issom

RAW (Rural Alive and Well), Standby, Black Dog, Lifeline, Theirs, Due South, Goodsport, Multicap, Tas Police, Tas Ambulance. I would now like us to have a minute silence for those who have been negatively affected by poor mental health & suicide."

After the unity message, Scotchtown and Irishtown took to the ground under lights. Both clubs played a tight first quarter with Irishtown making the first break through in the second quarter going into halftime 33 points up. Veteran Canary Dwayne Everett finished the day with four goals. The Tigers battled hard but were unable to break through
